For Flood For Congress.

That Mr. Flood had appeared to
many of the democrats of the 10th
district in a wrong light is indi-
cated by not a few of them of in-
fluence in the party so stating their
positions and their reasons for a
change of opinion. One instance
we here record in part, it being the
words of our esteemed contempo-
rary, the Rockbridge County News:
"Our former opposition to Mr.
Flood was not based upon personal
reasons. We looked upon him as
a representative of a coterie of ac-
tive young men in public life in
Virginia who, working together,
dominated the party and state and
were satisfied in so doing to be the
beneficiaries of and to perpetuate
what the Nottoway Democrats
have pronounced "Revolutionary"
practices in politics—others call a
much severer name—which were
overthrowing free government in
the state. To our surprise we found
him in the last general assembly so
soon as it met the avowed cham-
pion of a movement to hold a con-
stitutional convention to remove
from political power by force of
law the large ignorant Negro ele-
ment in the commonwealth and to
place the white man in full political
control in every county in the
state. We knew, as he must have
known, that under such conditions
a free ballot and a fair count must
prevail among the white people
in the Black Belt counties of Vir-
ginia such as has all along prevail-
ed in the Valley and the South-
west, and that with the ignorant
Negro removed from the registra-
tion rolls "Revolutionary" prac-
tices in Virginia politics would be
at an end and each ballot counted
as cast. With Anglo-Saxons on each
side it could not be otherwise. He
has stood from the day he entered
the last legislature to the present
as an exponent of this great reform
movement and has helped to guide
it along the highway to success,
the goal of which appears beyond
question only a short distance off.
What he had to gain by such ac-
tion cannot be divined unless he is
given credit for being actuated by
a desire for the welfare of his state.

**Notice to Teachers and Pupils of
Public Schools.**

At a meeting of the Board of
Trustees of Public Schools for
Highland county, held on June
21st 1900 the following was adopt-
ed:

On motion it is ordered that all
pupils entering the free schools
during the term beginning August
1st, 1900, including the teachers,
be excluded from said schools, un-
til they produce the certificate of
successful vaccination within the
past two years, from some physi-
cian in regular practice. This mo-
tion is made in accordance with
the provisions of section 80 of the
Virginia school law. Pupils re-
fusing to be vaccinated, and remain-
ing out of school, and thereby re-
ducing the number of pupils be-
low the legal average, shall not
effect the pay of the teacher of
pupils who comply with this re-
quirement of the school law.
