IT WILL BE A BIG DAY FOR MONTEREY

The Highland Tournament Association and The Monterey Gun Club have decided to join forces and make a big day of it at Monterey on Friday, August 28th.

On the afternoon of that day a long list of Knights from many sections, will vie with each other as to who can handle the long lance most dextrously, and can make the most graceful appearance, himself and his steed, before the fair ones who will judge them. Different sections of the county will have their favorite knights in line because of which already a friendly rivalry is being manifested and as the time draws near the interest will have increased to such an extent that a large gathering of county people will be present to witness the event. The place for holding the tournament has been selected and a track has been laid out. It is in the Fliasher field east of town and is well suited for the purpose. The committee having the matter in hand is busy and will spare no effort in making the occasion pleasant and enjoyable.

On the forenoon of the 28th, a feature, perhaps as pleasing to many as the tournament, will take place, which will be the annual trap shooting by the Monterey Gun Club. A handsome, loving cup has been selected, which will be bestowed upon the party cracking the largest number of pairs of pigeons in the double shooting contest. Also a championship medal will be awarded to the one breaking the most targets at unknown angles in the single trap shooting contest.

At the last public trap shooting two years ago Mr W A Bussard carried off the honors. Those desiring to contest for either or both of these honors should address the committees for terms &c.
