The War

The forces of the two belligerent nations of the East have been doing so many things lately that the country editor, with his limited space, is staggered at any attempt to give a report.

Under such circumstances it is a relief to shift the responsibility upon our enterprising "outside" people, and they do the work well, too, as many of our readers would testify.

Later reports than could be furnished in our outside columns are to the effect that, at a war council, called by the Czar for Wednesday, the peace terms proposed by Japan were to be considered.

Urging as a reason that he needs physical and mental rest, Kuropatkin is said to have asked to be relieved of his command.

The scattered Russians are gradually reaching Tai pass, exhausted and broken in spirit.

The Japanese are being continually re-enforced, and are believed to be working for the surrounding and destruction of the remaining Russian forces.

The loss to the Japanese is something like 41,000, while one of the many estimates of their victory gives the following figures as to Russian losses:

The entire cost of the campaign will be provided for by subscriptions from public spirited Virginians. Mr. Thomas Branch McAdams, of Richmond, is chairman of the Finance Committee, and the work is making fine progress.
