Judge W G Loving, charged with the murder of Theodore Estes, whom he accused of wronging his daughter, Miss Elizabeth Loving, during a buggy drive on Sunday, April 21, was indicted by the grand jury early in the week. The case came up before Judge Barksdale, and the fight over the change of venue began at once, and nobody knows how long it will last. A number of affidavits were submitted along with this application, the accused himself claiming that he could not get a fair trial in Nelson county, as half the people there were related to one family or the other. The judge was arraigned, pleaded not guilty, and was admitted to bail in the sum of \$7,000, his security being Judge J D Horsley, of Lynchburg.

The supreme court of the United States was overruled the demurrer of the state of West Virginia in the original proceedings against the state of Virginia, in which the latter seeks to compel the former to assume a portion of the indebtedness contracted by Virginia before the creation of West Virginia. The order was announced by chief Justice Fuller who declared there could be no doubt of the jurisdiction of the supreme court in the case.

Death of Mrs. McKinley

Mrs. William McKinley, widow of the martyred president, died at her home in Canton, Ohio, on Sunday afternoon. She had suffered a stroke of paralysis several days before her death.

She was nearly 60 years of age. The funeral took place Wednesday afternoon. Deceased had many years been an invalid. Her two daughters—Ida and Kate—died in 1873 and 1874, aged 13 and 33 years respectively. Mrs. McKinley drew a pension and was left an estate of \$212,000. It goes to Miss Helen McKinley and Mrs. Duncan, sisters of the late President, whose brother died a few years ago.

Another Jail Bird

Last Sunday morning the Highland authorities were notified of the fact that one Pat Rose, who left Durbin on the previous evening and was headed our way, was wanted for several offences, and deputy sheriff Jordan set about to apprehend him. Just after dark, the officer found him at Mr. W. A. Beverage's, south of town, trying to secure conveyance down the river. He claimed not to be surprised at the arrest, but demanded the officer's authority, and said he would not go to West Virginia without a requisition.

The prisoner is a respectable looking Irishman, a barber by occupation, and says he was guilty of nothing wrong except the taking of a watch, and offers this explanation concerning it: The watch belonged to a boy with whom he worked in a shop at Durbin. He had been carrying the watch for a week or two, and, on Saturday night while all hands were drunk, he decided to leave and forgot that he had the watch.

There are rumors as to other charges, but we have heard nothing to confirm them. Rose is locked up here awaiting the action of the West Virginia authorities.

Elsewhere in this issue will be found notice of reward offered by the School Board for information leading to the conviction of parties committing depredations upon school property, and, while the purpose of the Board to apprehend the guilty parties is commendable, it is to be regretted that such stringent measures are necessary. We have heard, from time to time, of these deeds of petty vandalism, and perhaps nothing will tend to break it up more effectually than to make an example of some one. The school trustees are the custodians of the school property, and their duty and right to care for and protect these houses are clear and unquestioned. The law is rigid on the subject, and the penalty for violations such as are charged is severe. We are led to believe that the depredations charged have, in a large measure, been committed by thoughtless boys who doubtless feel that a certain license is given them because the house is a public building and unoccupied. Parents who have any suspicions that their boys may be among them, will do well to warn them and impress upon them the fact that the course adopted by the trustees is going to get some one into trouble unless such conduct ceases. Conviction on such a charge would be shameful in the extreme. Let the mischief stop.

Young Men's First Voting.

Attorney-General W. A. Anderson last week wrote a Salem man in answer to an inquiry as follows: "Upon paying, at any time not less than 30 days before the election in November next the sum of \$1.50 to the treasurer of your county your son, whom you inform me became of age on the 3rd of April last, will be entitled to be registered and to vote at the election to be held on the November 5th next under the first sub-section of section 20 of the constitution."

June Weather Forecasted

We learn from Hicks, the weather prophet, that a regular storm period extends from the 2nd to the 7th. It is central on the 4th, with the moon on the celestial quarter on the 5th. The crisis of this period will fall on and next to that date. It will be preceded by marked rise of temperature, with rapid and decided fall of barometer, and the culmination will come in sudden and severe thunderstorms, cloud-bursts, hail, wind and possible tornadoes.

A reactionary storm period is central on the 9th, 10th and 11th. The new moon is on the 10th, in the midst of the magnetic crisis that falls annually on and about the 11th. Earthquake will be reported in many quarters of the globe within three days of noon on the 10th. Rising barometer, west winds and change to much cooler will spread eastward over the country following hail storms and cloud bursts, about the 11th to the 14th.

The third regular storm period will prove one of the most decided times of turmoil in June. It is central on the 15th and will come to its culminating stages during 16th to 18th. Let no one take shelter under green trees during these vicious thunder storms in June. The lightning of a coming thunder storm is different from the harmless sheet lightning which blazes all around the heavens in the June nights.

A reactionary storm period falls centrally on the 20, 21 and 22. The June solstice and the mercury disturbance are central together on the 21st. The moon passes over the celestial equator, working south on the 20th. On and touching that day look for sudden and very decided rise of temperature, with a corresponding fall of the barometer.

The fifth regular storm period has its center on the 27th, reaching from the 25th to the 29th. The moon is full and in perigee on the 25th and at extreme south declination on the 29th. Low barometer and other storm condition will appear at the beginning of this period and solstice storms of rain, wind and thunder will continue daily through the greater part of same, especially central to eastern parts of the country. Another marked seismic period will fall from about the 24th to the 27th, most notably on the 25th and 26th. Heavy storms about the 25th to 28th will bring danger or alarm to you and yours if you are not ready for them. Probabilities are that the heaviest and most general rains in June will fall during this closing period of the month.


