New York Stock Market.

New York, Oct. 10.—The stock market was somewhat less active than yesterday and the movement of prices was irregular. The professional dealers were responsible for the bulk of the transactions. London sold some of the international stocks, but was not much of a factor in the dealings. The opening was moderately active, most stocks showing advances. The early trading was marked by strength and this condition lasted until the end of the first hour. The market closed weak at general net losses.
