




**WOMEN'S TEMPERANCE UNION.**

Proceedings of the National W. C. T. U.  
Yesterday.

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 21—Mrs.  
Stevens, the vice-president of W. C. T.  
U., opened the convention this morning  
in the absence of Miss Willard.

After devotional exercises Dr. Mary  
Wood Allen, superintendent of the  
purity department, read her report. She  
was followed by Mrs. Emelie D. Martin,  
national superintendent, who reported on  
"purity in literature and art." Mrs.  
Nasmi D. Tomlinson, of Pennsylvania,  
national superintendent, read a paper  
on "Parlor Meetings." Mrs. Louise C.  
Purinton, of Massachusetts, presented  
the report of the department of fran-  
chise. She said the women realized  
they must get their help from the ballot.

Mrs. M. B. Ellis, of New Jersey, after  
reading her report as superintendent of  
the department of legislation, referred  
to the governor of New Hampshire as  
one who has not favored W. C. T. U.  
legislation and added: "Remember him,  
ladies."

Mrs. Bailey presented the report of  
the department of peace and arbitra-  
tion and Mrs. Matilda B. Corso, of  
Chicago, told about the workings of the  
Women's Temperance Publishing Asso-  
ciation of that city.

An interesting feature of the session  
was the memorial service of the twenty  
W. C. T. U. workers who have died  
since the last meeting. Mrs. Clara C.  
Hoffman, of Kansas City, conducted it  
and "Mother" Thompson, of Hillsboro,  
Ohio, led in prayer. Addresses were  
made by Mrs. A. S. Benjamin, of Mich-  
igan, Mrs. Perkins and Mrs. Stevens.
