Thanksgiving Service.

Thanksgiving services will be held at Trinity Church Thursday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Donations to the poor will also be made, which may consist of clothing, groceries, money or anything that will be useful in the homes of the poor.

Foot Ball in Lynchburg.

A great game of ball will be played in Lynchburg to-morrow between the V. M. I. of Lexington, and the V. A. M. C. team, of Blacksburg. A special train will be run from Christiansburg, and if enough people desire to attend the game from this city a special coach will be added to the train for their benefit.

Juniors' Ball To-night.

The Junior Hose Company will hold their Thanksgiving eve ball at St. Andrew's hall to-night. All arrangements have been perfected by the committee. Prof. Devon's orchestra has been engaged for the occasion, and the grand march will begin promptly at 8:30 o'clock.

In the Courts.

In the case of the commonwealth vs. M. Goldman for running a junk shop without a license the jury found a verdict of acquittal. The colored doctor, Richard Broadnax, was fined \$30 in one case and \$50 in the other on the charge of practicing medicine without a license and without having first obtained a State certificate.

Christian Endeavor Delegates.

Every mail is bringing the names of delegates intending to visit Roanoke during the time of the Christian Endeavor convention, beginning next Friday night and continuing over Sunday. Quite a large number of visitors are expected. The Roanoke members of the convention will wear a bow made of two ribbons, showing orange and black, while the visitors will wear white and blue.

New Cotton Mill at Danville.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Riverside Cotton Mill Company at Danville it was decided to erect another large mill of 350 looms capacity on the north side of the river. This will make the Riverside mills the largest in the South. The work will begin at once and be prosecuted with vigor, furnishing employment to many idle laborers. This mill will be arranged to run by either steam or water.

Police Court.

In the police court yesterday E. I. Ross was fined \$5 for being drunk and \$10 for carrying concealed weapons. Dan Ruffin, charged with larceny of a dog from John T. Trout, was postponed. The frog from Massie's pharmacy was brought in court and made to disrobe before appearing again on the street. Ann Davis, white, was fined \$10 for keeping a disorderly house and sent on to the grand jury on the charge of malicious wounding. J. D. Whitworth, of Franklin, was fined \$3 for selling liquor without license and sent on to the grand jury in the commonwealth

case. He gave bail in the sum of \$100 for his appearance. Mollie Ham, white, was assessed \$5 for being drunk and disorderly. An unknown white man was locked up on the charge of being drunk and when he sobered up put up \$5 for his appearance, which he forfeited. Jerry Stone, colored, charged with trespassing on the Norfolk and Western railroad, was fined \$2.50.

Roanoke College refuses to play Alleghany in Roanoke Thanksgiving. By a very timely act of faculty Alleghany plays Y. M. C. A. at 3 o'clock Thanksgiving afternoon. Every effort made to have another college here for that date was unsuccessful. Alleghany will be strengthened both in the line and behind with better players than when they played the Y. M. C. A. before, but will not have a walk-over by any means.

Smith, colored, who was arrested here last week on the charge of murdering a negro man in that city in last December, was not wanted there, as it was definitely known that he is not the man. The chief of police of Charlottesville also enclosed the amount of cost for telegraph fees in the matter. Smith was released from custody.

Address to Students.

Dr. J. L. Stone gave the students of the National Business College a very interesting address yesterday morning, in which he reviewed briefly the progress of business colleges as a factor in the business world, and spoke of the position they very deservedly hold in the estimation of the public. He also gave a short history of phonography, from its original crudeness to its present state of perfection. Many points of ambition, uprightness and industry were brought out, and, altogether, it was a most instructive as well as entertaining address.

Brewer, an employe of the Roanoke Street Railway Company, and Miss Josie Bowles, sister to Mrs. Workman. The ceremony was performed by Rev. P. A. Anthony, of the East Roanoke Baptist Church. A number of the intimate friends of the young couple were present, and the presents were both numerous and costly. The happy couple went to their home on Campbell street shortly after the ceremony.

Big Revenue Raids.

Deputy Marshal Jno. R. Greene recently made a raid on the distillery of Brock Zolman in Purgatory Mountain, Botetourt county, where he found fifty barrels of whiskey in his warehouse, 1,000 gallons of brandy, gauged and un-gauged; eighty-one gallons of brandy was found in the attic of his residence, also a barrel of brandy in a stamped whiskey barrel which was hidden. Zolman was arrested and held under heavy bonds for his appearance before the United States courts. Mr. Greene in following the matter up made two other heavy raids in the Alleghany mountains and in Rockbridge county. The particulars could not be learned.
