A SEVERE SHOCK.

On Wednesday Glenn Smith, a fireman on the Norfolk and Western, fell from his engine at Shumate, and struck the back of his head and neck on the hard ground. He was knocked senseless, and remained in that condition eighteen hours. The injured man was brought back to Roanoke, where he has sufficiently recovered to be able to be on the streets again.

COMMITTEE MEETING.

An important meeting of the Republican city executive committee will be held in the office of Phil. Lockett, on next Tuesday evening, the 14th, at 8 o'clock. A full attendance is desired, as business of importance, concerning the coming Congressional convention, will be transacted.

DEATH OF AN INFANT.

William Russell, an infant son of Helen and H. D. Guy, aged 20 months, died yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the family residence, 905 Patterson avenue. The funeral will take place at the residence this morning at 11 o'clock and will be conducted by Rev. Dr. Carson after which the remains will be shipped on the noon train to Lynchburg, where the little one will be laid to rest in the Spring Hill Cemetery.

IN NEED OF REPAIRS.

The street near the West End bridge has been torn up for the distance of seventy-five or a hundred feet and left in a desperate condition for more than a week. It has been stated that no effort has been made to put the street in a passable condition. It should be looked after by the proper officials and the parties who are responsible for the prevailing condition should be required to make the necessary repairs without any further delay.

DAMAGE BY RAIN.

Prof. S. C. Wells, of Roanoke College, the local weather observer, reports Wednesday's rain fall at 3.6 inches. It would represent a snow fall of three feet if it had come in that form. The damage done in the country was considerable. Corn in the lowlands was completely submerged, foot logs and bridges across the streams were washed away. The dam of the Salem rolling mill was washed out and the new reservoir of the Baptist Orphanage near Salem, which had just been completed, was entirely destroyed.

COUNTY REPUBLICANS.

W. Lee Brand, county chairman, has issued a call for a mass meeting of the Republicans of Roanoke county to be held in the town hall, Salem, on Monday, July 20, at noon, for the purpose of selecting a county chairman, county committee, a member of the Congressional committee for this district, and eight delegates and eight alternates to represent the county in the Sixth district Republican convention at Lynchburg, July 30.

THE JURY DISCHARGED.

In the hustings court yesterday in the case of Robert Quinn, charged with seducing Miss Grace Workman, the jury

after being out about two hours reported that they could not agree and were dismissed by the judge. It is understood that they stood 8 to 4 for conviction. G. H. Penn qualified as an attorney to practice law in the courts of this city. In the afternoon the case against Phillip Coleman, charged with stabbing James Hunt in the face with a knife, was on trial. The prisoner was represented by Thomas M. Wood. The jury rendered a verdict against the prisoner and he was fined \$5.

A. B. Woodridge, a well-known citizen and old resident of Roanoke, is critically ill at his residence on Patterson avenue and Ninth street from Bright's disease, and his friends have no hope of his recovery.
