BACK FROM THE SEACOAST. W. W. Workman and wife returned yesterday from a three weeks visit to Norfolk and Newport News. Mr. Workman is much pleased with Newport News, which he says is a thriving and progressive city of more than ten thousand inhabitants. There are many former residents of Roanoke in that city, all of whom are doing well.

A REVENUE RAID. Revenue Agent B. B. Bouldin, together with eighteen men, returned yesterday from a revenue raid in the mountains of Floyd and Franklin counties. They divided into three squads and succeeded in destroying one illicit distillery and arresting ten men. There was some shooting done by the mountaineers, but no damage was done and no one was hurt. Two of the prisoners were released on account of sickness, while the other eight were taken to Floyd Court House, where they were given a preliminary hearing before Commissioner Spencer. Five of them were committed to jail, and the remaining three gave bond.

THE SCHOOLS TO OPEN. The public schools of Roanoke will open on Monday, September 14. It is urgently requested by Superintendent Rust and the school officials that parents be ready at that time to enter their children, as effective work can only be done in this way.

CAMPAIGN NOTES. The Democratic campaign in this city will be formally opened Monday night with a joint rally of the Bryan-Sewall and Central Democratic clubs. The meeting will be held at the Old Opera House, and will be called to order promptly at 8 o'clock, and the chief speaker of the evening will be Hon. A. P. Staples, the Democratic nominee for elector in the Sixth district. Mr. Staples has given much study to the money question, and the public may expect an able discussion of the issues of the campaign, particularly of the Democratic position on the silver question. All Democrats and the public generally are invited to attend this meeting.

BOYS' BEWARE. There are a number of boys in the city who make a practice of running in front of the street cars in a sort of dare-devil manner that is very unsafe, and at the same time unwise. If it is not stopped some parents need not be surprised to learn of a severe accident and possibly death in the near future.

PETTY THEIVING. Much complaint is made of petty thieving in the southwestern part of the city. Pigeon houses have been raided, and fruit taken from trees without leave, and steps to stop the marauders are urgently necessary. It would be well for the police to keep a special watch on that section for awhile.

WILL BE GONE A WEEK. Rev. S. L. Rice, pastor of the United Brethren Church, will leave to-day for Churchville, Augusta county, to conduct a four days' bush meeting. From there he will go to Fisher's Hill to preach three days at a camp meeting. He will return in time to occupy his pulpit in this city a week from next Sunday. Rev. T. R. Reeves, of Randolph-Macon College, will preach for him at the United Brethren Church next Sunday morning and evening.

POLICE COURT. In police court yesterday morning fines were assessed as follows: Unknown tramp, nuisance, \$2.50; Mark Taylor, colored, was arrested yesterday by Officer Talley on the charge of stealing a lot of electric wire from the Roanoke Street Railway Company. The case will be heard to-day. Judge Woods fined Will Mitchell, colored, \$20 and gave him sixty days in jail on the charge of stealing a watch from Daniel Stanfield. In petty larceny cases Judge Wood is making an

enviable record, and if he keeps up at the present rate, the police court will become a terror to Roanoke thieves. In regard to the disposal of this class of cases by the police justice, no criticism can be made by those who are favorable to law and order.
