THE ATLANTA REVIVAL. Dr. Broughton Meeting With Great Success in Georgia.


Rev. Dr. L. G. Broughton, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, who is now in Atlanta, Ga., by the unanimous invitation of all the Baptist Churches of that city, to conduct revival services, is meeting with great success in his new field of labor. The papers of Atlanta give accounts daily of the services, and all speak in very complimentary terms of the Roanoke pastor. The Atlanta Constitution and Journal of that city have both published life-like pictures of Dr. Broughton, and have given considerable space to the meetings and addresses of the Roanoke minister. The Journal in giving an account of the conference of the Baptist ministers on Monday morning, February 15, soon after the beginning of the revival, has the following concerning Dr. Broughton: The conference was unusually interesting this morning, all the pastors of the city, with a few exceptions, being present. They all reported an unusual amount of interest in the work on yesterday. Rev. L. G. Broughton, the doctor preacher, who has come here from Roanoke, Va., at the invitation of Dr. McDonald, to lead his people in a great evangelistic work, was presented to the conference by Dr. Landrum, and extended the right hand of welcome to Rev. R. L. M. Fother, the present pastor of the Central Baptist Church. Dr. Broughton responded in a short talk in which he stated that he had felt called of God to come to Atlanta. He had another invitation to go to another city, but he felt that he should come here and was satisfied that God's hand was leading him and that a great work was to result from his labors if the pastors co-operated with him. He suggested that, if this was to be a general meeting that the pastors of the different churches hold prayer meetings at their churches every afternoon at 3 o'clock. There would be at the Second church, a prayer meeting from 11 to 12 each day and a service at night, beginning at half past seven. The first half hour of the meeting would be devoted to a service of song led by a choir composed of not less than 150 voices from the different Baptist Churches. Promptly at 8 each night, there would be preaching.

THE SMITH TRIAL. William D. Smith is sentenced to the Penitentiary For Two Years.

The Radford, Va., Advance of Friday says: The trial of W. D. Smith came up last Tuesday in the hustings court for the third time for the robbery of Capt. A. Robinson's store. Twice before has this case been tried, once with a Radford jury and with a Giles county jury. In both instances the trials resulted in hung juries. In the trial this week the jury was from Lynchburg, and was composed of the following gentlemen: R. P. Camp, J. L. Welford, James Sloan, Henry T. Adams, Geo. D. Urquhart, J. L. Vanness, Silas Ogden, Walker D. Lee Grant, G. H. Poling, H. L. Woodson, F. C. Welford and D. C. Moorhead. Mr. Smith was ably defended by Messrs. Phlegar, Blair, Longley and Jordan. The prosecution was by City Attorney W. R. Wharton, J. C. Wyster and J. D. Peters. The case went to the jury yesterday afternoon, and after being out about forty-five minutes they returned a verdict of guilty and gave the prisoner the lowest term, two years in the penitentiary. This is one of the most noted cases in the history of our city, and at the end of the trial of all the parties we will give a full history of the case. The trial of Ben Smith will come up to-day (Thursday). A motion will be made this morning to set aside the verdict in William Smith's case, and failing in this it is understood an appeal will be taken to the court of appeals.
