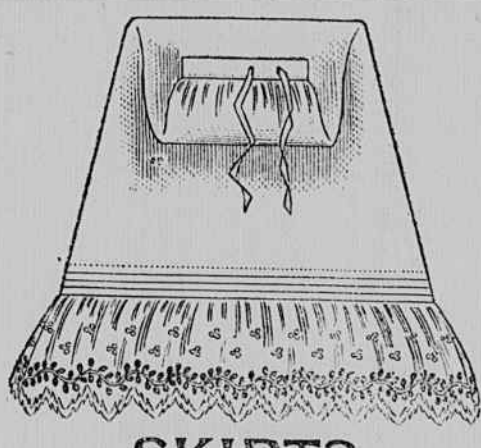

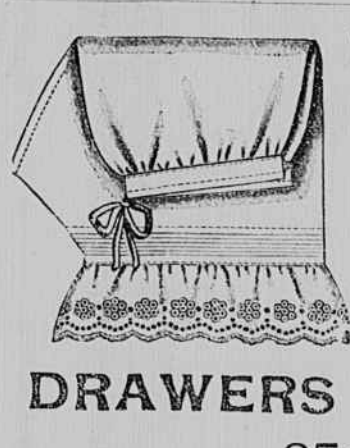

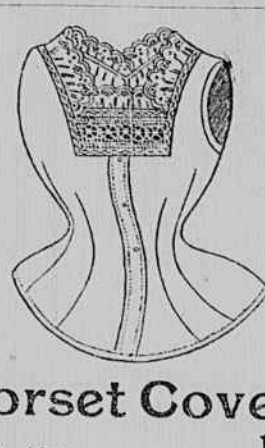

MORE EXCEPTIONS.

Another Move in the Trust Company Case.

In the case of Bachrach et al. against the Roanoke Trust, Loan and Safe Deposit Company the following exceptions were filed yesterday:

1st. Exception is taken to that portion of the report of the Commissioner A. L. Payne, made in this case. The undersigned, representing creditors secured by deed of trust, made by said Roanoke Trust and Safe Deposit Company to said L. H. Cooke, trustee, make the following exceptions to portions of said commissioner's report:

2d. Exception is taken to that portion showing under head of "bills payable" a disbursement of \$2,712.43 to the First National Bank of Roanoke, for which amount said trustee claims a credit on his account and upon which he claims commissions, and because if said trustee paid said amount as stated, he had no warrant or authority for so doing.

3d. Exception is taken to that portion thereof which reports under head of "Reductions paid," the following notes, to-wit:

Home Building and Conveyance Company, note \$2,000.
E. E. Denniston, note \$500.
E. H. Wolf, note \$100.Terry Building Company, note \$5,000.
Terry Building Company, note \$714.35.
H. M. Darnall, note \$750.
J. W. Truitt, note \$500.
J. Allen Watts, note \$743.
A. Baker, note \$106.25.
T. V. Robinson, note \$1,250.

Home Building and Conveyance Company, note \$4,000.

Roanoke Grocery and Milling Company, note \$4,000.

Because the said report does not explain or show the nature of this transaction, nor upon what grounds said trustee claims these amounts as disbursements made by him. If he paid these notes out of money held by him as assets, he had no right, warrant or authority for doing so. If he has not paid them, he is not entitled to credit as disbursement nor to commissions thereon.

4th. Exception is taken to that portion allowing salary to H. M. Darnall for continuous services under said trustee, the same being unnecessary and operating as a continual drain upon the funds in the hands of the trustee to which creditors are entitled.

5th. Exception is taken to that portion allowing discounts of ten per cent on city warrants amounting to \$297, and ten per cent amounting to \$24.30. Such being a waste of the assets in trustee's hands to that extent; the sale of said warrants was unnecessary, for the reason that the money received therefor has not yet been paid over under order of court, and they could have been used at par value in payment of taxes and could

have been sold on much better terms.

6th. Exception is taken to that portion of said report relating to rents received by said trustee in this, it does not show upon what property nor for what time the same was received. Nor does it show what disposition is being made of the rents for the building on corner of Campbell and Jefferson street, known as "Masonic Temple Building," which the creditors have been informed is the property of a joint stock company, whose entire stock belongs to and forms a portion of the assets of said Roanoke Trust, Loan and Safe Deposit Company and held by said trustee as such, and the rents therefor should be accounted for; nor does said trustee account for or report the rents accruing from other joint stock companies, such as the Terry Building Company, Home Building and Conveyance Company, Scottish Investment Company, and others, whose stock is owned chiefly by the said Roanoke Trust, Loan and Safe Deposit Company, and as such are assets in the hands of said trustee, and the property belonging thereto embraces valuable buildings and improvements, yielding rents which should be accounted for.

AT AN END.

The Venezuelan Commission Has Terminated Its Existence.

Washington, Feb. 27.—The Venezuelan commission terminated its existence today at noon, when its members, Justice Brewer, Frederick R. Coudert, R. D. White, Justice Alvey and President Gilman, accompanied by Secretary Mallett, proceeded to call on the President and delivered their report for the work accomplished in the year of its existence.

While the report does not indicate any conclusion as to the merits of the controversy which led to the appointment of the committee, its work having been stopped before the actual determination of a true divisional line between British Guiana and Venezuela, it is understood that the enormous mass of evidence collected through the committee's efforts will make that decision possible by an impartial court in the future. This evidence, which has not yet been printed, is completely arranged for filing in the archives of the State Department, where it will be available for the arbitral tribunal which meets at Paris in 1898.

Today's visit to the President was brief and marked with cordial expressions of the President's satisfaction.

Washington, Feb. 27.—Naval orders were issued today as follows: The board for standardizing specifications and samples of supplies at the New York navy yard having completed its work has been dissolved and its members ordered as follows: Pay Director L. G. Billings to special duty in the bureau of supplies and accounts at Washington, and Commander T. A. Lyons, Lieut. J. A. H. Nickelson on waiting orders.

Assistant Naval Constructor D. C. Nutting is detailed as a member of the board on hull changes at the Columbia Iron Works, Baltimore.

Lieut. H. W. Harrison is transferred from the Independence to the Oregon, relieving Lieut. W. R. A. Rooney, granted leave.

Lieut. Commander E. C. Pendleton is ordered to examination for promotion March 8.

GREEK VESSEL SEIZED.

Canea, Crete, Feb. 27.—The Greek steamer Thereus has been seized by a British torpedo boat belonging to the united fleet while attempting to land provisions and munitions of war for the Greek troops at Plantania. Three members of the Greek chamber of deputies, M. Papakian, Espanis and Raselo, were on board the captured vessel.
