President Cleveland has gone on another duck hunt in the Carolina sounds, but, as he is now permanently retired from office, no serious international consequences are likely to follow.

The Spaniards have gained another victory over the rebels with a loss of eight killed and fifty-two wounded on their side at Caranito and Paso Buoy in the Santiago de Cuba province; but there appears to be a few rebels left.

Hawaii is already knocking at the doors of the Union for admission. The Republicans are looked upon by the leaders of the little republic as friends of annexation; but it is by no means certain that this will be resorted to in a hurry by the party now in power.

Harold Sewall, son of the Democratic candidate for Vice-President, will be appointed minister to Hawaii by President McKinley, it is said, as a reward for the work done by him in the last campaign for the Republican ticket.

St. Louis has been visited by another meteorological phenomenon. Last year a terrific cyclone carried death and destruction to a considerable part of the city and on Thursday night twelve square miles of the western suburbs were flooded by a cloud burst, which drowned two men and destroyed an immense amount of property.

The Chattanooga Tradesman reports that business in all lines has greatly improved in the South in the past month or so, manufacturing plants in this section being almost twice as busy as in the North and East.

The deadly cyclone is leaving the broad prairies of the West and Northwest and meandering among the mountainous district of Kentucky and West Virginia. It begins to look as if no State or section is secure from these horrible visitations; but so far the country east of the Appalachian range, has been blessed with comparative immunity from these whirling electrical storms.

Poor Cuba is not likely to find much more encouragement in her struggle for independence from the McKinley administration than from that of Mr. Cleveland's as the policy of the new government is likely to be the same as that pursued by its predecessor.

Consul General Lee seems to have secured important concessions from the Spanish government in regard to Americans imprisoned in Cuba. All are to receive a prompt trial and, where their innocence is established, they are to be released.

Considerable talk was caused by the appearance of the dusky ex-queen of the Hawaiian Islands in the diplomatic gallery on inauguration day, and Secretary Olney was much abused therefor.

Report That They Will be Removed From Bluefield to Max Meadows. The Wytheville Dispatch says: There has been a report in circulation here for some days to the end that the car shops of the Norfolk and Western road at Bluefield are to be removed to Max Meadows.

From what we can learn the entire Norfolk and Western system will soon be re-divided. In other words, as it is there are now thirteen divisions, and it is believed that under this proposed change in the divisions, they will be cut down to from three to five.
