TYLER IN THE LEAD.

On a recent occasion in Lynchburg a party of twenty-one gentlemen representing as many counties, were discussing State political matters and upon suggestion a vote was taken on the choice for gubernatorial candidates, resulting in 18 for Hon. J. Hoge Tyler, 3 not voting. Those from the eastern portion of the State were specially favorable to a candidate from the Southwest and spoke in terms most complimentary of Col. Tyler.

HUSTINGS COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The case of R. A. Buckner against the Virginia Brewing Company was called in the hustings court yesterday morning and occupied the whole day. This case is a suit brought by R. A. Buckner for salary as director of the Virginia Brewing Company during the time he held office as president. The defendants claim that while he was holding the position as president and receiving his salary as president, he was not entitled to salary as a director, as provided in their by-laws. The jury after being out about an hour brought in a verdict allowing the amount claimed by Mr. Buckner less two months salary as director and allowing an account the Virginia Brewing Company had against him for \$25. The amount sued for was \$120. R. R. Hicks represented Mr. Buckner and the Virginia Brewing Company was represented by Messrs. Bryan and Berkeley. H. P. Roberts was appointed sealer of weights and measures yesterday for the city of Roanoke.

CHARTER RECORDED.

The charter of the Roanoke Lightning Churner Company was recorded in the clerk's office yesterday. This charter grants them the right to manufacture, buy and sell churns and to buy and sell territory. The capital stock of the company is not to be less than \$6,000 nor more than \$10,000. Wm. Booth is president, J. P. Little vice-president and general manager, and E. L. Stone secretary and treasurer.

A SERIOUS CHARGE.

A colored boy was arrested yesterday on suspicion of being Charley Baker, who is wanted for attempting to murder his aged mother, Bettie Baker, who lives out on Franklin road, Thursday night. It appears that Charley Baker came home about 8 o'clock in a sullen mood and after eating his supper sat around grumbling and muttering. His mother attempted to get him to bed, but he would not go, so she retired. Upon her retiring and, apparently, without any provocation, he picked up a revolver that was lying on the bureau and fired at her. The ball struck her head nearly on top, glanced around and came out near her left ear. As soon as he fired the shot he ran out of the house and at last reports had not been captured. The boy arrested yesterday proved not to be the one wanted. Charley Baker is a light ginger-colored negro between 13 and 15 years of age and is wanted here for several other offenses.
