The Staunton Daily News in its issue of May 19th, has the following to say concerning Staunton and Augusta county, which have heretofore been considered Elyson's stronghold:

Major J. Hoge Tyler, candidate for governor is in the city shaking hands with his old friends and making new friends. He arrived Monday night, and will probably not remain longer than to-day. He expresses himself as pleased with the situation; he expects to be nominated for governor by the Democrats with many votes to spare. There are substantial grounds for his confidence. He has a large following in the county, and in the city also. It need surprise no one if he gets the majority of the vote of both Augusta and Staunton. J. Taylor Elyson, who perhaps started out in the lead here, seems to be losing ground, if the expressions of the people are to be relied on. Major Tyler is not taking sides on the question of a constitutional convention, frankly stating that he has not made a study of it, but he does not hesitate to say that he favors greater economy in the State administration, and such changes as may be needed to bring this about. He says, if elected, he will keep constantly in mind the lightening of the burdens of the people.

DIED IN HIS OFFICE.

Prominent Alexandrian Takes an Overdose of Medicine. Alexandria, Va., May 19.—Frank E. Corbett, a prominent business man of this city, died in his office, at the corner of Fairfax and King streets last night. Death was caused by an overdose of chloral and bromide of potassium. He was beyond medical aid when discovered. Mr. Corbett was 57 years of age.
