X RAYS IN MURDER.
The Judge Allowed the Haynes Jury to Inspect the Photograph.
Watertown, N. Y., Oct. 22.—An X ray photograph was used yesterday for the first time in a murder trial in New York State in connection with the defence of Haynes. The State insists that a 32-calibre bullet struck Allen on his jaw, that it split, and one piece was deflected into the chin and that the other piece is in the back of Allen's head. The defense says that the substance at the base of Allen's skull is not a fragment of a 32-calibre bullet, but is a complete 32-calibre bullet. To prove this, the defense produced an X ray photograph of Allen's neck, showing the substance which resembles a bullet near the second vertebra at the base of the skull. Dr. Gilbert Cannon, of this city, made the photograph, and, from experiments, says that the bullet is not a 32-calibre bullet.
Both sides argued for several hours this afternoon over the offer in evidence of the photograph by the defence. Justice Wright finally allowed it, and it was examined carefully by the jury.

MUST LEAVE QUIETLY.
Havana, via Key West, Oct. 22.—A dispatch from Madrid to El Diario de la Marina says that the government has called Lieutenant-General Weyler strictly prohibiting any demonstration on the day of his departure for Spain and intimating that if these instructions are not complied with by him he will be held strictly accountable.

SEA COAST DEFENSES.
General Wilson Submits His Report to Alger.
Washington, Oct. 22.—General Wilson, chief of the engineers of the army, has made his annual report to the secretary of war. It is devoted to the fortifications and rivers and harbor improvements of the country. The estimates for coast defenses for the years 1898-1899 make a total of \$5,810,000.
General Wilson says that during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1897, there was expended on river and harbor improvements \$13,461,395. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 1899, his estimates are: Continuous work authorized by Congress, \$18,876,007; for other works not provided for by continuing contracts, \$29,452,153.
SPAIN'S REPLY CONSIDERED.
She Will Formally Protest Against the Filibusters.
Madrid, Oct. 22.—The queen regent presided over the cabinet council yesterday. Senor Sagasta was absent. Senor Gullon, the minister of foreign affairs, explained at length the present status of Spain's diplomatic relations with the United States and declared that the cabinet was entirely in accord as to the policy to be pursued.
At the meeting of the cabinet to-morrow, Senor Sagasta, presiding, the ministers will consider the draft of the answer of Spain to the note of the United States, on the subject of Cuba. It is understood that the reply will contain a formal protest against filibustering.
