# SALEM

There are two cases of scarlet fever in Salem—one at Judge W. W. Moffett's and the other at Palmer St. Clair's. While there is no cause for alarm as long as the weather continues warm, it might be well for our people to be as careful as possible in regard to this fever, which is contagious and dangerous to the young. A Salem is a city of schools; it would be a good idea for the city council to pass an ordinance requiring physicians who have scarlet fever patients to promptly report same to the mayor or some one of the corporate body, who might be constituted a health officer. We simply offer this as a suggestion, thinking that in case of contagious diseases it is well to be careful.

We learn that the large frame building situated on the south side of Roanoke river, originally known as the Chadwick Two-wheeler, but now known as the Southern Carriage Works, will shortly be torn down by its purchaser, G. W. Palmer, and transferred to the property of the Tom's Creek Coal and Coke Company, near Coeburn, in Wise county, where the lumber will be used in the construction of houses. Thus another landmark of the "boom" will be swept away.

Evangelist J. W. Hypes has returned from Crystal Hill and Clover, in Halifax county, where he has been holding a series of religious meetings.

Mrs. W. Lee Brand and children have returned from a pleasant visit to Pittsburgh, Pa.

Constable E. R. Carter on yesterday served a commonwealth's warrant on a colored man by the name of Prince Miller, charging him with killing a cow belonging to Andrew King. It was ascertained afterwards that the murdered cow belonged to King's wife and as the warrant was thus far defective the case was for the present dismissed.

## SPANISH SOLDIERS REVOLT.

Declare They Will Not Fight Against the Cubans.

Madrid, Oct. 27.—Recent troubles among the troops at Santander have become serious. The soldiers refused to dress themselves in the colonial army uniform yesterday, and announced that they would not embark for Cuba. The authorities tried to calm them, not being willing to employ at once the harshness of military law, which punishes with death such rioting.

But the soldiers, thinking the authorities are afraid of them, say, in private conversations, that they will refuse to go on board the ship when the day comes, the 5th of November. The barracks are now strongly guarded. As a matter of fact, they will at once be reduced to obedience if they attempt any resistance, but the government strongly dislikes the idea of employing violence. It is said several socialist agents have been at work among the soldiers.

## A CLEAN SWEEP ANTICIPATED.

Mr. Bethel Expected to Put in an Entirely New Force of Clerks.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 27.—Collector of Customs Wallace will be called on to surrender his office to John S. Bethel, the new collector, by November 1st at the latest. A prominent Republican stated that four changes have already been decided upon by Mr. Bethel. Others will follow later. It is quite probable that, despite civil service regulations, a clean sweep will be made by the new appointee. The Republicans here are demanding this of Mr. Bethel and he will doubtless follow their demand to the limit of his power. Collector Wallace and his assistants have made all preparations for vacating and are daily anticipating the order to move out.

Frank T. Murphy, who has been selected as chief clerk by Mr. Bethel, has returned from a visit to Washington. While in the Capital City Mr. Murphy conferred with a number of prominent officials on matters pertaining to the interest of the party in this State.

## WRECK ON THE N. AND W.

Engineer Mays Killed and Fireman Riggs Loses a Hand.

Bluefield, W. Va., Oct. 27.—Norfolk and Western passenger train No. 12, from Columbus, Ohio, to Norfolk, Va., was wrecked near Welch yesterday afternoon. The engine, mail car and baggage car went down an embankment about twelve feet, turning over on their sides. The engineer, A. J. Mays, was killed, and Fireman Frank Riggs had his right hand cut off. Mail Clerk Bowles was slightly injured. No passengers were hurt. The accident was caused by a breaking rail.

## PIPES-YOST.

Staunton, Oct. 27.—Miss Alice Yost, daughter of Maj. F. M. Yost, was married yesterday evening to Mr. D. M. Pipes, a prominent merchant and planter of Jackson, La. The ceremony was performed by Rev. F. J. Prettyman, of the Methodist Church. The parlor was banked with flowers. After an elegant supper the couple left on the evening train for the West.

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## FIGHT OF WILDCATS.

Battle to the Death Between Two Animals in an Express Car.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 27.—Messenger W. D. Gamber, of the Wells Fargo Express Company, sat in one corner of his car on his last trip from Kansas City east holding a revolver in each hand while he awaited the outcome of a savage encounter between wildcats caged in a wooden cage hardly wide enough for the animals to turn about in.

The fight lasted an hour, and when the growls and snarls had subsided enough to give the messenger courage to make an investigation he found in place of the smaller of the beasts a few tufts of hair and pieces of bone. The fight had been to the death, and the larger animal, after killing its mate, had devoured its body. The cats had been shipped from Fall Brook, Cal., to Bezin Furd, Martin's Ferry, Ohio. They had apparently lived in peace during the journey over the mountains until they were transferred in Kansas City.

## SEVEN MEXICANS KILLED.

While Trying to Protect a Murderer From Arrest.

Yuma, Ariz., Oct. 27.—A pitched battle at Maxamoth Tank, forty-five miles west of Yuma, between Yuma county officers and twenty-five Mexican railroad laborers yesterday afternoon resulted in the death of seven Mexicans, the wounding of several more and the dangerous wounding of Deputy Sheriff Gwilder, of Yuma. For a quarter of an hour the fight was fast and furious. The sheriff was trying to arrest a murderer.

## COLORED APPOINTEES.

One Hundred and Seventy-Nine of Them From March 4 to October 15.

Washington, Oct. 27.—In response to numerous inquiries on the subject the number of appointments of colored persons to positions in the government during the periods from March 4th last to October 15th are ascertained to have been 179, carrying salaries amounting to \$129,390 per year. Of these appointments four were made under the State Department, 72 in the Treasury, 18 in the Interior, 10 in the Department of Agriculture, 8 in the Navy, 14 in the Postoffice Department, and 53 in the Government printing office.

The number appointed during the same period in 1889 was 96, carrying annual salaries amounting to \$75,600.

The promotions during the period from March 4, 1897, to October 4, number 125, carrying salaries aggregating \$8,740.

The number promoted during the same period in 1889 was 20, with salaries amounting to \$17,830.

## WANTS MORE MONKY.

Berlin, Oct. 27.—The Frankfort Zetting publishes a dispatch from Madrid which quotes the Spanish minister of finance, Senor Puigcerver, as saying that a fresh, large loan is necessary, as the funds of Spain will be exhausted in June, 1898.


