

MR. HANNA HUNT'S HOUSE. As Congress Wouldn't appropriate He Will Have to Pay Rent.

Washington Times: Representative King, of Utah, offered as an amendment a few days ago to the District appropriation bill a proposition to expend \$50,000 in repainting and upholstering the White House and otherwise fixing it up as a pleasant place of abode for Senator Hanna, a well-known citizen of Ohio, temporarily residing in Washington.

MAY RUIN THEIR BUSINESS.

Building and Loan Men Wrought Up Over Proposed Legislation. Norfolk, Va., Feb. 5.—The building and loan men of this section are very much wrought up over proposed legislation affecting their business, and to-day there was a meeting of representatives of the principal companies, in Norfolk and Portsmouth.

The meeting was a brief one, but everything was to the point. A resolution was passed instructing the secretary of the meeting to write to Richmond to discover when the measures will come up for consideration.

One of these bills proposes to limit the rate to be charged by building and loan associations to 6 per cent. The other is to tax individual shares. The building and loan men say if these measures pass they will ruin the business, and that every association in the State will have to go into liquidation.

MRS. McKENNA HAS LOST. Washington, Feb. 5.—The appointment of O. A. Petty to be postmaster at Charleston, W. Va., has been made after a hard fight. The present occupant of the office is Mrs. McKenna, the widow of the late Senator McKenna, and her friends have made every effort to prevent any successor being named.
