THE LIFE SAVING SERVICE.

Something About the Men Who Risk Their Own Lives to Save Others.

ATLANTIC CITY, July 31.—There are more things in this neck of Jersey than the great board walk, the swash of the sea, the myriad of bathers and the dainty summer girls. Next, of course, to the latter, one of the things that have most interested me is the life saver. He is a sun browned, quiet, unobtrusive individual. As you see the life savers seated on their perch overlooking the beach, or idly pulling their boat around among the bathers, or now and then rescuing a too venturesome swimmer from treacherous sea puss, the life of these keen eyed, strong limbed guardians and rescuers does not appear to be especially strenuous.

The careful observer looks into the eyes of these apparently indolent men and sees a certain something written there which tells of indomitable courage, waiting only for the supreme moment to be called into action. It is when the angry seas beat wildly against the shore and the mocking cry of death comes shrieking through the storm that the splendid courage of the life savers is brought into full play.



FIRING THE LIFE LINES.

There is nothing indolent in their life then. They are no amateurs in danger, who laugh and think heroism a cheap and easy thing. They know the task before them and launch their cockleshell out on the giant waves, fully realizing, every man of them, that the chances are against them.

Along the Jersey coast, from Cape May to Sandy Hook, embracing what is known as the fourth district, there are 40 life saving stations, about every one of which some thrilling story of wreck and rescue, of devotion and daring, could be told. It takes nerve and promptness of decision to be a life

saver, and the men whom I have met along this coast display these qualities in marked degree. Many of them have medals awarded by the United States for feats of especial daring, and right well have they deserved them. Among these medal wearers is Christopher Ludlam of the Hereford inlet station, who was decorated for running a boat out through a great gale and snow-storm to the rescue of a lime schooner. She was stranded and afire, and there was no sane reason for one of that little body of rescuers ever coming back alive. But there was an insane risk, and they took it and did come back, not only with themselves, but the men they went to get.

An instance of the characteristic devotion to duty of the life savers is shown by an incident in the experience of John Patterson, keeper of the Shark river station. As Patterson started out to launch the surfboat to go to the rescue of a distressed ship a messenger ran to him with the news of a dying brother, beseeching that he come to his deathbed. Patterson stood a moment with his hand on the gunwale of the cockleshell. The crew stood respectfully silent; then the keeper threw back his head and said as simply as if superintending a pleasure jaunt, "Shove her in." He knew his duty and did it unhesitatingly.

While at the life saving station here the other day I picked up a black cloth bound volume issued by the government. As a rule, one does not look for anything of a thrilling character in government reports. But this was an exception. It was the report for the year ending June 30, 1899, of the United States life saving service, which was recently issued. Although the annual reports of this department are condensed into small space and are given up largely to statistical tables and charts, it is impossible to read them without feeling that back of the simple, concise statements of fact lie many romances of the sea, many records of heroism, many dark and tragic chapters of human experience.

The report shows that 265 life saving stations are maintained. Of these, 193 are on the Atlantic and the gulf coasts, 56 on the great lakes, 15 on the Pacific coast, and one station is at the falls of the Ohio, at Louisville. At by far the greater number of these stations the crews numbered six men, at others from seven to nine, and at one station, that at Cleveland, there were ten men. Within the field of station operations last year there were 428 disasters to documented vessels and 294 disasters to undocumented vessels, such as sailboats and rowboats. On the documented vessels there were 3,903 persons, of whom 56 were lost. SAMUEL HUBBARD.
