CARRYING LIVE STOCK AT SEA.

How Ocean Steamships Handle Cargoes of Horses and Mules.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 4.—European markets are clamoring for American meat, and as a result the exporters of live stock are experiencing great difficulty in supplying demands. Steamships loaded deep with cattle, sheep and hogs are clearing every day for foreign ports. Glasgow, Liverpool, London and Havre receive the bulk of the shipments, but coast cities farther to the southward are also supplied.

The transatlantic live stock trade is a traffic of comparatively recent origin, having been begun in Boston in 1870, when several small consignments were recorded. The animal shipping methods which came in vogue during the succeeding 10 or 15 years were at the time considered equal to any emergency or sudden demand that might arise.

Contrasted with the methodical and humane manner in which modern live stock carriers do their business, however, the pioneers in the trade appear to a decided disadvantage. In former days the stock were dragged on board in brutal fashion and placed in rudely constructed temporary pens. The inclosures were built on the open deck, extending the whole length of the ship.

So unstable were the pens in which was confined the living cargo that in stormy seasons hundreds of cattle would be washed overboard and drowned. The high waves in their mad course would sweep irresistibly down the decks of the laboring craft, carrying away thousands of dollars' worth of prospective steaks, roasts and chops. The injuries inflicted on many of the remaining animals were damaging in the extreme. Legs, hoofs and oftentimes backs and necks would be broken in the wild rushes for shelter, making imperative the destruction of the sufferers.

The British Society For the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals finally awoke to the need of remedying the evils. Investigations were made. Reforms were instituted. Shipowners were compelled to prepare vessels exclusively for the cattle trade and to erect stalls guaranteed to withstand the attacks of the most violent storms.

The bureau of animal industry of the United States department of agriculture also promulgated suitable laws relative to the transfer of live stock abroad, and now animals receive ample care and protection. Old Father Neptune and his galaxy of mermaids have as a result of this state of affairs been forced to erase from their menus all meat diet and subsist on strictly vegetarian pabulum.

Horses and mules are frequently passengers in large numbers on board the cattleships, or "cowboats," as they are termed by seamen. Great difficulty is encountered in "loading in" the spirited animals. When worst comes to worst, huge slings of leather or stout wooden crates are called into play. The fractious quadruped is then inclosed

ed therein and hoisted high in the air by means of a powerful derrick. He is then lowered to the deck at the desired spot.

The British steamship Veritas, now docked at the South street wharfs, is a typical live stock transport. Her main deck, both fore and aft, is given up entirely to cattle and horses. The stalls are narrow and ranged in two rows. Between the rows extends a long passageway used by the cattlemen in fulfilling their duties. Each stall contains a feed box. Plenty of bedding is allowed the inmates, as it forms a protection from bruises and broken bones in boisterous weather.

This vessel carries her sheep pens on the hurricane deck. They are very exposed. The captain explains the matter by stating that during the spring, summer and fall months they are perfectly safe. He claims in the winter only is there any danger, and then the wool producers are stowed "tween decks."

Probably one of the most exciting occurrences on board a "cowboat" was the experience which befell the crew of the steamer Tritonia in the fall of 1898. The Tritonia cleared Delaware breakwater for Glasgow with 400 head of cattle, 700 sheep and twoscore horses and mules. When in about 50 degrees east longitude and 42 degrees north latitude terrific head seas were encountered. The deck stalls were torn from their fastenings. Maddened steers and horses were set free, and a reign of terror such as man has seldom seen prevailed. Three members of the crew were trampled to death in endeavoring to corral the beasts. The captain barely succeeded in saving his life by crouching under the bulwarks until the stampede was forced by sheer exhaustion to quiet down.
