The Schools and Chautauqua.

At the last meeting of the school board, April 7th, the following resolution was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the board heartily commends for its elevating, uplifting and healthful influence, the work being done by the East Coast chautauqua. They believe that our school work should be in close touch with all efforts tending to educate and refine the masses. They are impressed that by co-operating with the chautauqua management great benefit may be done our entire county, and especially the teachers and advanced pupils in our schools, who may be admitted to all the exercises under favorable conditions. We may render it possible for them to attend, distribute literature of the association through the medium of teachers and pupils to patrons and people, thus aiding in advertising the enterprise, and more clearly presenting the claims of chautauqua work to the public mind, more fully defining what it is and does.

We are assured for the future of some special lectures of high order, especially for teachers, which will generally tend to improve the standard of instruction in our schools.

Disabled Yacht.

Captain Cante, of Jacksonville, the well-known Florida east coast pilot, and of Spanish-American war notoriety, arrived in town Monday from Indian River narrows, where he was forced to leave his yacht, the Seminole, on account of disabled boiler. The boat is about fifty feet long and very fast, and Capt. Cante was bringing her around from Tampa to Jacksonville, expecting to stop at this place and put in new boiler, as that is the only defective part of the boat. With him was engineer McCullough, who was formerly engineer on the steamer Rockledge, when that steamer was plying on the waters of Indian river under command of Capt. R. P. Paddison. Cante and McCullough did their level best to reach this place with the boat, but could not quite make it. The boat is left in charge of parties near Narrows postoffice, and Capt. Cante went to Jacksonville Monday to return in a few days after his boat. Engineer McCullough left Tuesday afternoon for his home in Tampa. He gave us the above details.
