

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' MEETING

Final Account of Their Proceedings in Session Last Week.

Wednesday, Nov. 5th, 1902.

Meeting called to order by the chairman. Present, J. R. Walker, chairman; R. Miot, R. A. Conkling, J. C. Jones and J. F. Bell; A. A. Stewart, clerk, and P. Brown, sheriff.

The minutes were read and approved. It was ordered that \$300 be transferred from the fine and forfeiture fund to the delinquent prisoners fund.

Petition of citizens of Oslo and Viking for a public road was received and the following committee appointed to mark, lay out and lay out the same: M. B. Danes, J. Helseth and Chas. Gibbons.

Report of poll taxes collected by the collector for the year 1901 amounting to \$13.00, and for 1900 amounting to \$6.00, as received and filed.

The treasurer's report was received and checked up. Messrs. Bell and Conkling were appointed to destroy the paid warrants turned over by the treasurer with this report. They reported they had done the same, and were discharged. The treasurer had his usual certificate of deposit attached to his report.

Report of the superintendent of convicts was received and filed. The order striking Mrs. M. Futch from the pauper list was reconsidered and she was replaced on the pauper list at \$5.00 per month.

Mrs. Report of J. L. Carruthers and P. J. C. Hall, committee appointed to view, mark and lay out a public road to Titusville, was received, and, without objection, the same will be declared a public road at the next meeting.

The clerk's report of tax certificates redeemed and purchased during the month ending Oct. 31st, 1902, was received. Mr. Berry, the bond of the county treasurer was child at \$26,000.00 and the bond of the three collector at \$30,000.00. (The assessment is fixed by law at \$1,000.00.)

Mr. W. of errors, insolvencies and double engagements presented by the tax collector was received and allowed. The assessment roll for the county for every year 1902 was examined and approved by the board.

Reports of Justices of the Peace John Livingston and H. G. Bronson and C. F. vanKling were received.

Report of tax collector of licenses collected during the month of October, amounting to \$2,459.00 state and \$1,399.50 county, was received.

The clerk was instructed to charge the collector with 153 polls collected that were not assessed.

The tax collector was allowed to carry on the insolvent list 412 polls assessed that were not collected.

The road report of P. A. McMillan, G. H. Paddison and J. O. Fries for a road from Malabar to Melbourne was accepted and approved. In accepting the road on the river front the board found by comparison that from Mrs. Minor's south line to the north line a majority of the property owners wanted the road as per the report of this committee. Therefore, a petition from J. F. Farley et al. for a road covering practically the same route, as noted above, was rejected.

The comptroller was requested to make a report allowing the clerk of the circuit to assign tax certificate No. 183, to the value of \$100.00 and to allow to the clerk of all the other tax certificates the full value and to allow to the clerk of the land embraced in the tax certificate to leave at their face value and not to collect the tax on the same.

The comptroller was requested to make a report allowing the clerk of the circuit to assign certificate No. 570, sale of the north half of lot 3, section three, range 34 east, (40

The title face value, with interest to be paid, to the redemption of all tax certificates against said certificates, what all subsequent taxes on your land, the tax levy for each year on the valuation of \$100.00, without interest, this valuation being the valuation for the last year.

Meeting of John J. Padgett was rejected. Matters of S. E. Harbour, A. Gibson, Mrs. C. M. Abdill, Mrs. A. K. Benj. Hogg and M. E. Till, laid from last meeting, were taken up. After comparison with other assessments it was found that they are not excessive, therefore the board refused any reduction.

In the matter of the road from Mico to the Sebastian river, the board found that the superintendent of roads and guard of convicts made a mistake at the place, in that he left the place of the biggest committee. In the matter of the Roseland road the commissioner from the third district was instructed to compromise with the parties whose lands are interested. Upon failure to make the compromise he is to enter condemnation proceedings.

In the matter of the river front road at Eden, now comes L. E. R. LeTourneau and R. J. Richards and enter protest against the appropriation of their lands for right-of-way for a public road upon the line reported by the committee at this meeting, and require that said right-of-way be acquired by the exercise of the right of eminent domain.

Death of W. H. Gleason.

W. H. Gleason, of Eau Gallie, died at his residence on Saturday evening and was buried on Monday, Archdeacon Brown conducting the service.

Mr. Gleason was one of the most widely known citizens of the east coast of Florida, and, up to the time when failure of health compelled him to give up the activities of life, he was one of the most energetic and enterprising. He was far-seeing, and his fertile brain constantly evolved more projects than any one man, no matter how great his means, could possibly carry to a consummation.

Mr. Gleason was born in Tioga county, New York, in 1829. When 18 years of age he removed with his father's family to Marquette county, Wisconsin. Young Gleason became a surveyor and civil engineer, and was engaged as assistant engineer on the work of connecting the Fox and Wisconsin rivers. He also served as seargent-at-arms of the state assembly and also of the senate. In 1855 Mr. Gleason founded the city of Eau Clair, Wis., on the Chippewa river, where he organized a bank, of which he was president, and secured the location of the United States land office. Having studied law he was admitted to the bar, and in 1858 returned to his native town and married Miss Sarah Griffin, who survives him. After the conclusion of the civil war Mr. Gleason came to Florida and gave his best energies to the development of the state. He served for two years as lieutenant governor and also as a member of the assembly. He conceived the idea of uniting the different portions of the state by a series of short canals, connecting the principal rivers. This work has been partially carried out and will doubtless be completed eventually.

Several years since Mr. Gleason was stricken with paralysis and his active career came to an end. He has been able to get around town and was a familiar figure about Eau Gallie, always coming to the station to see the train. His last sickness was of only a few days' duration and the end came very peacefully Saturday night.

The funeral service at the Granada was largely attended by the people of Eau Gallie and Melbourne. Rev. F. W. Weatherwax and daughters came up from Melbourne to assist in singing. The interment took place in a grove on the hill, Mr. W. H. N. Fairbank on a perfect Indian grove, in Alachua who has ever lived in credit to the firm faith in cluster of plants, the grasp of its possessor, the grove of Gleason.
