Simplon Tunnel Victims.

The great Simplon tunnel cost eighty three lives in its construction, says the Milan correspondent of the London Express. It has claimed two more victims since its completion. Several engineers, traveling in a special train to inspect the newly finished work, were met by poisonous gases, the ventilating machinery failing to act. Signori Grassi and Bianco were overcome, the former expiring on removal to a hospital. The other night Signor Bianco also succumbed to the effect of the poisonous fumes.
