ESTIMATE OF TOMATO CROP.

Mr. S. J. Sligh, of Jacksonville says the tomato crop of the Florida east coast will probably not exceed 300,000 crates. The west coast, which produced last year between 250 and 300,000 crates, Mr. Sligh thinks, will reach 700,000 this year. This means about a million crates for the entire state up to say June 15th.

BITTEN BY A SHARK.

While Dunham Coxetter and several other bathers were in the ocean off Pablo Beach Monday morning, Mr. Coxetter, who was about seventy-five yards from the shore, was suddenly attacked by a shark, which bit him slightly on the chest and then seized his right leg near the hip and badly lacerated it. He swam towards shore and was assisted by those close at hand and was carried to St. Luke's hospital, Jacksonville. While the injuries will not prove fatal, it is believed they will cripple the young man for life. Dunham was telegraph operator in Titusville some twelve years ago.

ST. LUCIE COUNTY CREATED.

The bill to create St. Lucie county from the southern portion of Brevard county was passed through the senate on third reading last Friday. The passage of this bill through the senate, where it was strenuously opposed, is considered by his friends quite a victory for Senator Hudson, who has worked without cessation for its passage since the convening of the legislature.

Senator Frank Sams, of Volusia, was the leader of the opposition to the bill, and made a strong speech protesting against the passage of the measure, but on roll call the vote stood 18 to 11 in favor of its passage. In fact this bill has been the only measure in the senate so far that has called up any spirited debate.

The bill having already passed the house, only the signature of the governor is now needed to make the bill a law in fact. It becomes a law upon the governor's approval, and we have been informed by a prominent citizen of the newly created county that its organization will date from July 1st. Further that the bill is a very lengthy one and has not yet been printed. We are told that the boundary line follows the section line dividing sections 30 and 31 running east until it intersects the Sebastian river, then following said river to its confluence with Indian river, thence continuing east to the Atlantic ocean.

"JIM CROW" BILL IS SIGNED.

Gov. Broward has signed Avery's "Jim Crow" bill, which becomes operative July 1st next, and which provides a separation of the races on all street cars in the state.

Cocoa, Fla., May 24th, 1905.

This office will be removed to Jacksonville, as is usual each season, and the change this year will be made next Saturday, the 27th inst. We have just had in returns netting \$2.43 per crate, and the markets are in generally fine condition and wanting our pines.

I can quote our fine reds at from \$2.00 for good 48s to \$4.00 for fine, well packed 24s. Would be glad to have ten carloads today, just to fill special orders, and such lots, if running of good fruit, well packed, would net some very handsome prices. We are anxious for fruit, but bear in mind that it is still cold at the north, and be sure to let your pines be full, pale green and just ready to color.

If the fruit is picked black green at this early season, it will arrive too green for prompt sale and thus will have to be held to color, so that nothing will be gained. The reputation of our pines is based on their fine color, when ripe, and exquisite flavor, which pines picked dead green will never attain.

Stand by the old association. This is our tenth season, and we have records to show the value of the work we have done for our shippers in these past seasons, and are in better condition than ever before to make you the best possible net result. Every new association trying to market fruit from this section is simply putting your fruit in competition, and causing a fight for markets. We make a specialty of the pines of this section, handle none from any other portion of the state and no foreign fruit. Our association shipping stencil or stamp has come to be a trade mark for your fruit. This is certainly of value. We have always encouraged buyers, and should be glad to sell F. O. B., shipping point or Jacksonville, but would point out that the really right way to sell is for the grower to sell his whole output for the season, of all grades and sizes. It is a mistake, in my judgment, to sell off a few cars of your finest fruit at the best part of the season. Today we can ship and net a higher price for a standard car of fine reds than would be paid by a buyer F. O. B.

We want buyers who will make a contract and take a whole crop or so many cars each week, right through the season. I am making special efforts along this line this season.

Please advise me—addressing me at Jacksonville after the 26th—if you are in need of association shipping stencils, stamps, or books.

DEATH OF C. BARNES SANDERS.

The sad news announcing the death of Mr. Charles Barnes Sanders was received in Titusville on Saturday last. He passed away at 8 o'clock Friday night at the home of his father, Mr. W. R. Sanders, in Indianola, having been ill with typhoid fever and pneumonia for about two weeks. He was the youngest son, a man of public spirit, generous impulse and possessed of that attractive personality that made friends with everyone. He was only 28 years of age. It was eight years ago this present month that he rescued three young ladies from drowning in the surf at Oceanus, and for this heroic deed he was awarded a gold medal. He was a member of the Baptist church and his death is a great loss to the county and a greater one to the community in which he lived. He is survived by his parents, two brothers and two sisters: William R. Sanders, of Kansas City, Mo.; James T. Sanders, of Miami, Fla.; Miss Alice Sanders, and Mrs. Dr. William S. Gramling, of Miami.

The funeral service was held Sunday morning by Pastor Howard B. Gibbons, and the interment was made in the Courtenay-Indianola cemetery.
