Suggestion for Marketing Fruit

Washington, D. C., May 4, 1909.

Don't you think it would be possible for the fruit and vegetable growers of the state to organize for the purpose of better marketing of their produce? Even to maintaining selling agencies in at least the large markets? It seems to me Florida stuff has been selling awful cheap here the past winter. I got 91 cents less than nothing on nine crates of beans.

I have thought several times of trying to write something on the subject. Kicking about shipping green fruit don't amount to much, for everybody is in the business for what they can get out of it and if a man thinks he can do better shipping early he is going to do it and I've seen some mighty nice ripe fruit sell this winter for less than the green had a couple of months before.

It also might be that the Florida experiment station might help the growers out by making a study of, and publishing the knowledge gained, citrus growing and handling a little more. The legislature might help out that way by giving them a little appropriation. Growers could learn a good deal about fertilizing, cultivating, packing, and about fighting insect enemies and diseases.

Antiquity of Cockroaches.

Some of the finest fossil insects known to geologists are those preserved in amber. Originally a gum exuding from a species of pine tree, the amber first captured the insect and then buried it, thus preserving every detail of its structure. The exhibition of a fine collection of cockroaches thus preserved at a meeting of the Entomological society shows the respectable antiquity of this unpleasant insect, for the amber deposits of eastern Prussia, whence they were obtained, are of middle tertiary age. The cockroach, as a matter of fact, however, can claim a much greater age, for a species of Blatta is recorded from the Purbeck beds. A related genus, Palaeoblattina, rates as far back as the Silurian.—London Globe.
