THE SOMMERS N. SMITH—A telegram was received this morning by Commodore Bazzell from Captain Frank Dunn, dated at Philadelphia, announcing the arrival of the Sommers N. Smith at that port, after a difficult passage on account of ice in the Delaware river.

THE BRICKLAYERS' STRIKE—A meeting of the trades council will be held to-night to consider the matter of the strike of the Bricklayers' and Plasterers' unions now pending. The employers have been invited to attend, and it is hoped the differences existing may be speedily and satisfactorily settled.

A SUGGESTION—Now that the Chipley monument is completed, and is awaiting the action of the committee for its unveiling, the suggestion is in order that the date of the ceremony be fixed for the afternoon of February 19 the evening of which day has been designated for the General Gordon lecture, and invite the general to make a brief address on the occasion.

A NEW LAUNCH—Messrs. McKenzie Orting & Co., received notice to-day of the shipment of their new launch, which the Gas Engine & Power Co. of New York have built for them. The launch is of the latest model, 26 feet long, with an improved 6 horse-power engine. She will be used to meet incoming vessels and cater to their wants. The new craft will also be used of the harbor police.

NAVAL STORES—The West Coast Naval Stores Company, whose main office is in Pensacola, is preparing to also take a prominent position in South Florida naval stores circles. They have bought part of the Garrison property on the river front at Tampa for \$20,000 and will erect an immense war house and rosin sheds. Several stirs for loading vessels will also be built. The property has a river front of 200 feet.

THE LABORERS' BANNER—A new paper of this name is to be published at Brewton. It is to be the official organ of the Knights of Labor of this district. Its editor will be R. L. McCoune, its publisher, Leslie McCoune and Arthur McCoune of this city, master workman of the district assembly, Knights of Labor, is to be traveling representative. This new journalistic venture should be read by all union labor men.

CRIMINAL COURT—In the criminal court the jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of David Morris, tried yesterday, charged with embezzlement. Jerry Denning, charged with aggravated assault, whose trial was begun yesterday evening, was acquitted. The trial of Will Himes, assault with intent to murder, committed on the person of Chas Kirkland near Ft. Marion in April last, was begun. NEW MAIL BOXES—New boxes have been placed at the corner of Wright and Alcaniz streets and at the corner of Gadsden and Hayne streets.

SPREADING OUT—Contractor C. H. Turner is to-day shipping on the steamer Torino to Havana, about 30,000 feet of lumber and 70,000 shingles, to be used in the construction of barns, packing houses and servants' quarters on a large orange grove near Havana, belonging to Mr. B. F. Hake, of Omaha, Neb., for which Mr. Turner has the contract. He has also contracted to erect a number of residences in the same vicinity. Thus Pensacola's industries are spreading out across the waters to the other corners of the world.

COMMANDANCIA WHARF—Progress has been slow in the work on the Commandancia street wharf, owing to delay in receipt of piling from the creosoting works. They are now arriving in small lots and one of the great pile drivers is at work. One of the main tracks has been laid, on immense timbers, to the present terminus of the wharf, enabling the piling to be delivered at the place where they are to be driven. All of the framing machinery has been installed in the old Piaggio mill building, to which a heavy sliding way for delivering timbers is being constructed.

MARDI GRAS—The finance committee, of which Collector D'Alemberte is chairman, reported fair progress in the collection of funds for the coming festivities, at a largely attended meeting of the Clerks' union held last night. A committee on costumes was appointed, who will leave to-day for Mobile, and may possibly visit New Orleans, in the performance of their duties. The work on the floats is progressing well, and only home labor is employed in their construction. A little more liberality on the part of the merchants, for whose benefit the enterprise has been more particularly designed, will be heartily appreciated by the union and its representatives.
