FOREST RESERVATIONS

Portions May Be Thrown Open For Grazing.

CATTLEMEN FAVOR THIS PLAN.

Forestry Associations Oppose It as Injurious to the National Parks. Revenue Cutter Service—Caste in Colored Society.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—[Special.]—For many years the western men in congress have had a standing problem to contend with in the settlement of the Indian question. The Indian question has now assumed a settled condition and the attention of the western men, when not directed to national affairs, turns toward the adjustment of differences over the large forest reservations. The congressmen have been between two fires—the men in their own states who want to have the forests reduced and opened for grazing purposes and those interested in forestry preservation who would create more reserves and have strict regulations keeping everything out of them. A compromise has been necessary and the indications are that it may be brought about. Some of the larger reservations will be reduced and portions not necessary to forest preservation restored to the public domain, while smaller reservations will be created. These will be selected after careful consideration and will include headwaters of streams, tracts of land where fire has destroyed the forests and a new growth has been started and picturesque and rare physical formations which may be desired in the future for national parks. Nearly all the western men have agreed to this arrangement, and the belief is general that it will be adopted. This will settle the only phase of the matter, as there is still a wide difference of opinion as to what regulations should be made regarding grazing of cattle and sheep on the reservations. The stockmen all over the west demand the right to pasture their herds and flocks in the reservations, while the forestry associations vigorously oppose the proposition, saying that a great deal of damage is done to the forests by stock grazing.

Revenue Cutter Service. The long pending bill to promote the efficiency of the revenue cutter service of the United States by placing the officers of that service upon the same footing as officers of the army and navy, giving them equal rank and pay and providing for their retirement for age, has received early consideration by the committee of congress and stands a fair show of passing. Heretofore every movement in this direction has been checked by the efforts of those men in congress who desired to transfer the whole revenue marine service to the navy. This always met with opposition not only from the navy officers who had been through a long and arduous course at Annapolis, but by others who thought that the revenue cutter service should be kept under the treasury department. The bill has now been modified so as to give the men in this service the same advantages within their own service as that enjoyed by officers of the other branches of the government service who perform hard and arduous work. The reasons why the bill may pass this session is because of the splendid record of the revenue cutter service during the Spanish war.

Colored Social Lines. Colored people in Washington have their social lines, which are drawn as tightly as those that divide them from the whites. For instance, there is a society composed of very light colored people of negro blood, and they do not admit the darker skinned element. Another social line is drawn relative to the hair—the hair line, so to speak. Kindly hair is a badge of low caste, and there is a constant struggle to get it straightened. The other day I heard two newboys of about 18 years

having a difficulty over the hair question. Both were of about the same shade of color, but the stronger had a little more kink in his wool than the smaller. The latter had been beaten or driven away from the corner, but he "got even" by remaining at a safe distance and as he circulated about the other counted the "knots" in the hair of the larger boy, greatly to his discomfort and to the amusement of the bystanders. "Why doan yo' shave it?" cried the tormentor. "Den yo' doan hab no knots, sho. Lemme see, dere's a lot of 'em, an I'll doan count 'em." And when he counted up to 100 the larger boy fled in chagrin.

An Undelivered Speech. When Jesse Stallings of Alabama first came to the house of representatives, he saw what every man sees—that the senate makes itself much more comfortable than the house—and he thought there was an opportunity for reform. He prepared a speech on the subject, giving in detail the expenditures in the senate and asserting that they were very extravagant. He then showed it to Speaker Crisp.

"That is a very good speech, Jesse," said Crisp, "but what are you going to do with it?"

"Make it in congress and send it through my district," said Stallings.

"Don't you want to remain in congress?" asked Crisp.

"Yes, and I think this speech will take mighty well among my constituents."

"Well," responded Crisp dryly, "I reckon you want to pass a bill or two while you are in congress, and if you make that speech I rather think any bill of yours would be hung up over there in the senate indefinitely."
