### Whether For Governor.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 21.—It is possible that when General Joseph Wheeler returns to Alabama from the Philippines within the coming week, he may announce his candidacy for governor of Alabama. Special friends of his have been suggesting this probability for some weeks and there was some suspicion that the little general had been approached on the subject and had not discouraged the idea, and a telegram received from Huntsville says that it is currently reported in many parts of the English congressional district that General Wheeler will likely not be a candidate for congress again. If he enters the gubernatorial contest there is no question but that he will be a very formidable candidate.

### RECENT INVENTIONS.

Fish are prevented from swallowing the hook by a newly patented guard which lies parallel with the shank and is slotted at the lower end to partially surround the shank until the fish takes hold, when it swings out and forms a stop by engaging the jaws.

For opening envelopes neatly and rapidly a handy device is formed of a round handle, with a steel blade projecting from the end, which is guided across one end of the envelope by a parallel strip of steel which engages the edge of the letter and steers the cutter.

A western man has patented a warming device for raising bread, having a lamp set in the bottom of a casing, with a number of trays to carry the dough arranged in a tier in an upper compartment, the heat circulating around the trays and passing off at the top.

### Railroad Will Be Extended.

KNOXVILLE, Feb. 20.—A special to The Sentinel from Middleboro announces a plan is on foot to extend the Tennessee Northern railroad from La Follette, Tenn., to Middleboro, a distance of 28 miles. The road will penetrate one of the richest coal, iron, zinc and mineral sections in East Tennessee. It now remains untouched on account of lack of railroad facilities. The Tennessee Northern now has no northern outlet.

OPELIKA, Ala., Feb. 21.—The city council of Opelika have decided to thoroughly sewer the town, and authorized the street committee to advertise at once for bids for the work. The engineer's estimate calls for about 9 miles of piping. The cost will be about \$30,000. The city is badly in need of the system and the new cotton factory makes it an imperative necessity.

### The Freeze In Florida.

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 21.—Reliable advices received by the state agricultural department say the damage done in Florida by the recent freeze up was comparatively slight. The freeze was of too brief duration to hurt greatly. Early vegetables in northern Florida were killed and fruit trees from Tampa north set back, but not killed. Cattle on ranges were not hurt.

### Crushed With an Ax.

CLAYTON, Ga., Feb. 21.—Lafayette Dockins, a member of a prominent family living in the eastern part of Rabun county, was fatally wounded by Thomas Bieckley. The wounds were inflicted with the pole of an ax in the back of the head and it is said Dockins cannot recover. His skull is supposed to be crushed and the pro use bleeding could not be arrested.

### Child Badly Burned.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 21.—The 6-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Willoughby is suffering from burns at Pratt City. She was standing before an open grate when her apron caught fire. Her clothing was burned entirely off, but she was saved by the timely arrival of assistance and, while severely injured, is not fatally hurt.

### INVASION IMPRACTICABLE.

London Says Buller's Transport Is Insufficient For Transvaal. LONDON, Feb. 21.—The Morning Leader says: "The crossing of the Tugela river was scarcely opposed, but that is not to say that fierce resistance may not be looked for before the Underbrook works are negotiated. A high authority agreed yesterday with the opinion expressed in these columns that two thirds of three fourths of General Buller's command will be available for active operations any time within a week. We cannot see how an advance through North Natal can be made before Charleston and Van Renen's pass are secure. As for the question of General Buller's invading the Transvaal, a practical difficulty exists. Our information is that his transport is utterly insufficient unless the Boers oblige him by fighting along the rail way. We look for one fight about Pieters Station and then the departure of the commandos of Free Staters for Drakensburg and the Transvaal and for Majuba. Nothing is going in North Cape Colony and the greater part of the Boers apparently have retired to fight in their own state. Expectation sits in the gate to know the result of the chase after General Cronje."

### Is Ferrerira Dead?

LONDON, Feb. 21.—A curious dispatch from Pretoria dated Tuesday, Feb. 20, announces that Commandant Ferrerira was killed Feb. 19, adding that his death was believed to be the result of an accident.
