CRONJE'S SURRENDER
HOURLY EXPECTED

Will Doubtless Prove Turning Point of the War.

BEGINNING OF THE END

Kelly-Kenny Criticized For Great Sacrifice of Lives in Sunday's Battle—Butler's Advances Toward Ladysmith is Painfully Slow.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Every hour is expected to bring news of General Cronje's surrender. On all sides wonder is expressed that the gallant yet glibly battler at Paardeburg drift has not yet ended in what is considered to be the inevitable. With 50 guns bearing upon the devoted band within the terribly short range of 2000 yards, surrender or utter annihilation can be the only result, unless all reports of the strength of the Boer reinforcements are wrong.

The critics canvass every untoward contingency that can affect Field Marshal Roberts and see nothing that can save General Cronje from the terrible fate in which he has been caught. Even an unexpectedly strong attack on Lord Roberts' lines of communication could scarcely, according to these experts, materially alter the result. Rumors were current this morning that the end of the struggle had actually come, but these emanated from information received by the Boers, which they subsequently discovered to be utterly without foundation.

The severe losses of General Kelly-Kenny Sunday have produced some adverse criticism, but it is pointed out that had he fought less furiously he would have given the Boers the opportunity to trench themselves and perhaps effect further flight to a more advantageous position. General Buller's progress towards Ladysmith is so slow that it scarcely appeals to public interest. General White appears to be still full of fight and to be endeavoring to assist General Buller by a vigorous bombardment.

Bombarded From Ladysmith. HOOP LAAGER, LADYSMITH, Wednesday, Feb. 21.—There was heavy fighting all Monday and Tuesday and it still continues since early this morning. Our officers hope to dislodge the British from their position. Last night a body of British troops tried to cross the river, but were beaten back with heavy loss. Our loss was slight. Our positions are being bombarded from Ladysmith.

Krugers' Wife Ill. NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—A dispatch to The Herald from Brussels says: Private letters from Pretoria received here announce that Mrs. Kruger, the wife of the president, is very ill. The war has grievously impressed her, and her health is also impaired by anxiety for his numerous sons and grandsons fighting for their country, one of whom was killed at Deerepoort.
