PRECINCT DELEGATES

Representative conservative democrats have endorsed the following ticket for delegates from the city precincts to the Democratic County Convention to be held at Towelton, April 14 and ask that they be given a hearty support by the voters: Precinct 12—C. H. Gingles, David Sheehan, Wm. Bazzell, J. D. Maxwell, and T. F. Wright.

BOTH the city and the county are to be heartily congratulated upon the agreement on behalf of their respective governments for securing jointly three beds in the Infirmary, the cost to be divided equally between them. The plain necessity of making some adequate provision for indigent sufferers from sickness or accident as legitimate objects of public charity was promptly realized and as promptly met.

SENATOR FORAKER'S proposed amendment to the Porto Rico tariff bill discloses more plainly than even the debates in the house, the evident purpose of the republicans to contend, at all hazards, for the preservation of the doctrine of protection, without reference to other subsequent results. It provides for free access into the island of all United States products, but insists upon the retention of customs duties upon all Porto Rico products imported into this country.

THOSE provisions of the new financial law, signed yesterday by the president, which will permit the establishment of many new national banks in the smaller towns throughout the country, with smaller capital than under the former law, promise great benefits to the South and West, where, at certain seasons of the year, a considerable scarcity of currency exists. These benefits will also be enhanced by the reduction of the tax on circulation, which will be only one-half the former rate. Another advantage accruing to all national banks, and enlarging the volume of national bank currency, is the extension of the amount of circulation to the full face value of the bonds which secure it, the old law allowing only 90 per cent.

Sheets versus Russell.

In recently defending the memory of the late lamented Albert J. Russell, THE NEWS had no expectation of being drawn into a controversy over the office of state superintendent. The comparison between the administration of that office by Major Russell and by the present incumbent was made from the official reports of the administrative officers of the state government, a practically complete set of which, from 1875 to date, is a prized possession of the editor of THE NEWS, The De Funiak Springs Herald, publishing THE NEWS' article on the subject, says: "Will THE NEWS, or some one knowing the figures, give us the difference in the cost of the two superintendents?"

The challenge was one that THE NEWS, possessing the information, could not afford to disregard, and having made a close and searching examination of the official records, presents the result in the shape of the table which follows, and which is self-explanatory:

SIX MONTHS' EXPORTS.

Foreign Shipments Made by the Gulf Transit Co.

Mr. M. W. Churchill of the Gulf Transit Co., has compiled a tabulated statistical report showing the details of the foreign export business handled by the Gulf Transit Co. for the six months from Sept. 1, 1899, to March 1, 1900.

The report shows that during that period the Gulf Transit Co. loaded for foreign ports 57 steamships, one schooner and one barkentine. The items of export were as follows:

VESSELS INSPECTED

By Capt. S. C. Cobb, Surveyor of the American Shipping Bureau.

Capt. S. C. Cobb, surveyor for the American Bureau of Shipping, returned last night from a trip to Apalachicola, Carrabelle and St. George Island. He inspected the schooner Benj. C. Cronwell of Portland, Capt. McClearn, which is undergoing repairs at St. George Island, to continue in her class, ready to be launched in about three weeks. Also the schooner Warren Adams, of Jacksonville, has been moved from her position about 1200 feet 'in the woods' to the beach, and is being made ready to launch in the canal excavated by E. E. Saunders & Co's, dredge Thackeray. These vessels were driven ashore in the Carrabelle storm.

Capt. Cobb also reports the store of the Franklin Lumber Co. and the railroad depot at Carrabelle rebuilt.

CRIMINAL COURT.

W. H. Trimmer Convicted of Selling Liquor Without License.

Yesterday afternoon's proceedings in the criminal court comprised the sentencing of Robert Devaughn, convicted of embezzlement, to 3 years in the penitentiary; a verdict of guilty in the case of Marsh Elliott alias Elliott; the case of Henry Williams, concealed weapons, was set for the 16th, and that of Alonzo Daniels, robbery, for the 17th; Emanuel Richardson, breaking and entering, pleaded guilty and sentenced to 10 years in the state penitentiary.

The court was engaged during the entire morning in the trial of Wm. H. Trimmer of Mobile for selling liquor without license. A number of witnesses were examined, and the case was ably managed and argued by County Solicitor Parkhill for the state and C. Moreno Jones for the defense. The charge of the judge was brief, clear and concise, and the jury was in consultation about half an hour, returning a verdict of guilty, accompanied by a recommendation to the leniency of the court. Counsel for the defendant gave notice of a motion for a new trial.

First Strike in Carolina M.I.

COLUMBIA, S. C., March 14.—The first strike in a South Carolina cotton mill occurred this afternoon, the operatives of the Warrenville mill, about 500, walking out after demanding and being refused higher pay. They made no demonstration.

Coal Miner Killed.

KNOXVILLE, March 14.—Frank Tarwater, a coal miner, was killed last night by a heavy ledge of slate falling in the Cross Mountain mine at Coal Creek. No other casualties are reported. The mine is owned by the Knoxville Iron company.
