**SIMPLE MAGIC.**

How to Cause a Coin to Disappear in a Glass of Water.

The object of this trick is to cause a half dollar piece to apparently melt in a goblet of water held in the hand of any member of the company. All that is seen is the glass of water, the coin and a large white handkerchief (preferably silk). In addition to these articles the performer requires a piece of glass the size and thickness of the coin. Select some lady to hold the glass of water. Take the coin and hold it conspicuously between the thumb and first finger of the right hand, first concealing the piece of glass in the palm of the same hand. From the nature of the glass it is easily concealed, and dexterity in palming is not necessary. (See Fig. 1.) Then throw the handkerchief over the right hand and while under cover change the half dollar for the glass disk, which can be easily



done by keeping up a brisk conversation to distract attention. After having switched the pieces withdraw the hand, retaining the coin therein, and let the lady grasp the piece under the handkerchief, which she imagines is the coin, but which is really the glass piece. Then cover the tumbler with the folds of the handkerchief and ask the lady to drop the "coin." It will be distinctly heard to fall in the glass. Then say "Presto" and ask the lady to remove the handkerchief from the tumbler, and the coin will have disappeared. The water can be emptied from the tumbler, and the suction will cause the glass disk to remain at the bottom, where it will be entirely invisible. (Fig. 2.) This trick can be elaborated by having the coin previously marked for future identification and after the handkerchief has been removed and the water emptied disclose the original coin from some distant place.

**GEN. WHEELER IN ALABAMA.**

Passed Through Montgomery Enroute to Washington. ATLANTA, March 15.—General Joseph Wheeler passed through Montgomery this morning enroute to Washington. He is traveling via the Southern. General Wheeler declined to discuss public questions. He evaded questions as to the probable fight against his taking his seat in congress and all national issues.

Discussing the situation in the Philippines he said he believed hostilities would cease so soon as the newly appointed commission should arrive in the Philippines. He was much impressed of the Filipino with whom he came in contact.

General Wheeler is in good health, having stood his voyage remarkably well.

SPEEDY TRIAL IS ORDERED. Men Charged With Assassination of Goebel Get Hearing. FRANKFORT, Ky., March 15.—At a conference between the county and district court officers here it was determined to have returned here Secretary of State Powers, Holland Whitaker, W. H. Coulton and Captain Davis, the four alleged accessories to the assassination of Governor Goebel and to give them a speedy examining trial.

The order of transfer from Louisville was made this morning by County Judge Moore, and deputy sheriffs will leave at once to bring the prisoners. The prisoners will be arraigned separately and it is thought that bail will be granted to two of them by consent of the commonwealth.
