ABLE COUNSEL EMPLOYED.

Men Charged With Murder of Goebel Have Strong Defense.

LOUISVILLE, March 16.—As a result of meetings held by a number of prominent citizens of Louisville, it is announced that ex-Governor John Young Brown has accepted the employment as chief counsel for the men arrested for the murder of the late William Goebel. This action, its promoters say, is taken in order that no innocent man may be convicted through the agency of the \$100,000 reward appropriated by the last legislature.

Ex-Governor Brown will be chief counsel and with him will be associated Hon. George Denny of Lexington, W. C. P. Beckwith of Lexington, Hon. J. L. Sims of Bowling Green, Hon. A. E. Willson of Louisville and several others. These lawyers have been instructed to push the cases to an early trial and failing in that to institute habeas corpus proceedings in the state and federal courts.

WATTERSON ON SITUATION.

Says Courts Will Decide and Democrats Will Win.

NEW YORK, March 16.—Henry Watterson of Louisville is in the city. He does not think there will be any serious trouble in Kentucky.

"Matters arising out of the gubernatorial contest and the assassination of Mr. Goebel," he said, "are in the courts and there they will be adjudicated. I don't believe there will be any bloodshed. In my opinion, the courts will decide in favor of the Democrats and I believe that all Kentuckians will respectfully abide by the decision of the courts."

Republicans Amend Answer.

LOUISVILLE, March 16.—The amended answer of the Republicans in the Beckham-Taylor consolidated suit involving the governorship, was filed with Judge Field in the circuit court today. It has been in preparation by ex-Governor Bradley, Judge Yost and other attorneys since Judge Field's recent decision declaring his court had no jurisdiction in the case, and that his court would not review the action of the legislature seating Beckham. The amended answer is made principally to perfect the record before the case is taken to the court of appeals.

Hazlipp Released on Bond.

FRANKFORT, Ky., March 16.—Secretary of State Powers, Captain John Davis, W. H. Culton and W. L. Hazlipp were arraigned before County Judge Moore at 11 o'clock and after some argument between the attorneys Hazlipp was released on \$10,000 bond. Judge Moore set the examining trials for Monday.

Rules for Lent.

All the faithful who have completed their twenty-first year and who have not begun their sixtieth year, and who are not exempted from the obligation of fasting by sickness, hard work or other well known reasons, are obliged to fast on all the days of Lent, except Sundays.

On those days but one full meal is allowed, which should not be taken before noon.

Custom allows a cup of coffee, tea or thin chocolate, and a small piece of bread or a cracker, to be taken in the morning; and in the evening, a collation, not exceeding the fourth part of an ordinary meal, is allowed. At this collation, butter, cheese, milk, eggs and all kinds of fruit, fish and vegetables are allowed. When the principal meal cannot without grave inconvenience be taken at noon, it is permissible to take the collation in the morning and the dinner in the evening.

Abstinence from the use of flesh is enjoined on all the Wednesdays and Fridays of Lent and on the Saturday of Ember Week and on Holy Saturday.

The use of lard is allowed in cooking.

Fish and flesh are not allowed at the same meal, even on Sundays. Eggs, cheese, milk and butter may be used every day, but abstinence from all of these is recommended on Good Friday.

Persons exempted from the obligation of fasting are not bound by the restriction of using meat but once a day on the days in which the use of meat is permitted by dispensation.

Children over seven years of age are bound by the law of abstinence, unless excused by sickness or other causes.

The paschal time, in which all Catholics who have come to the years of discretion are bound to receive holy communion worthily, extends from the first Sunday of Lent till Trinity Sunday, inclusive. Children over seven years of age are bound by the precept of annual confession. Pastors and parents should see that the children comply with this duty.

The holy season of Lent is a time of prayer, of sorrow for sin, of seclusion from the world and its amusements, and of generous almsgiving.

By a special indulgence granted to the bishops of the United States for ten years, dating from March 15, 1895, working people, who cannot easily observe the common law of the church, are dispensed from the obligation of abstinence on all days of the year except Fridays, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week and Christmas Eve. This dispensation does not exempt from the additional obligation of fasting, where such exists, nor does it authorize the use of fish and flesh at the same meal. It includes, however, not only the individual workmen in whose favor it is granted, but all the members of their families as well. In return it is expected that those who avail themselves of this indulgence will endeavor to enter into the spirit of the holy season of Lent by voluntary acts of mortification, penance and almsgiving. A most praiseworthy custom is that of abstaining during Lent from stimulants, in honor of the sacred thirst of our divine Savior.

Those who entertain any reasonable doubt about their obligation to fast or abstain, ought to apply to their pastor or confessor for advice.

SHE KILLED HER HUSBAND.

Says Her Life Had Been a Veritable Hell For Years.

CINCINNATI, March 16.—Charles Adams, a passenger agent for the Union Pacific, has been shot and killed by his wife. The only person present was Gertrude Tarman, sister of the wife.

Mrs. Adams said that she had been living in a veritable hell for years, that her husband threatened her life, that he would hold her eldest son by the heels of his head, outside of a fifth story window, and had been habitually cruel. He had recently threatened her life and she provided herself with a revolver for self defense.

He opened at supper with a terrific tirade of abuse, followed up with a blow across the nose which felled her to the floor, then struck her again. She struggled to her feet, drew a pistol, fired one shot which struck him in the shoulder. He turned his back and then she fired again. This time the ball entered behind the right ear and came out above the left eye. It was a fatal shot.

Mrs. Adams is detained at the police station. Adams was under surveillance by the police early this winter for terrifying messenger boys.

Negro Hanged For Assault.

KAUFMAN, Tex., March 16.—King Martin, a negro, was hanged here at noon today for criminal assault on a white woman. He stood upright in a wagon driven from the jail to the scaffold, more than a mile distant, and sang hymns all the way. Five thousand people were in town, but only about 60 were admitted to the gallows enclosure. Martin preserved his composure to the end and said from the scaffold he deserved his fate.

TAMPA, Fla., March 16.—Hon. Charles C. Whitaker has been appointed trustee of the East Florida seminary to succeed Dr. H. T. Lyles, who has resigned. Mr. Whitaker is a young man who is very popular in this city, and has many friends who are proud to know that he has been appointed to this responsible position.
