PRECINCT DELEGATES

THE newspapers of East and South Florida are filled with the customary dire warnings addressed to the gentle tourists who contribute so largely to the winter incomes of that section of the state, urging them to remain longer, because of the severe spring weather prevailing in the North.

Weather Summary For 1899. The director of the Florida section of the U. S. Weather Bureau has issued his annual summary for 1899, and it contains much that is both interesting and instructive.

The annual mean temperature for the state was 71.0, being practically normal. The highest annual mean was 76.8, at Key West; the lowest was 67.3, at DeFuniak Springs.

The average precipitation for the year was 53.93 inches, being below the normal. The greatest was 72.60, at Sebastian; the least was 29.55, at Key West.

was 169; partly cloudy, 138; cloudy, 58; slight rain, 100 days. The latest date upon which the last killing frost occurred in the spring was March 29, at DeFuniak Springs.

Concerning the extraordinarily severe weather of February the report says: Temperatures were abnormally low over a large portion of the state on the 8th and 9th, rising slowly thereafter until the 11th.

The mean monthly temperature was 4 below the normal. The highest mean monthly temperature, 70.2, occurred at Key West; the lowest mean monthly, 49.0, was recorded at Pensacola.

BOARD OF PUBLIC SAFETY. Movement for Reconstruction of Fire Alarm System. The regular meeting of the board of public safety was held this morning, with all of the members present.

The matter of the provision proposed for care and medical attention to sick paupers was taken up, and the proceedings taken by the committee of the city council were reported by Mayor Hilliard.

The chairman reported that he had ordered 5 fire alarm boxes, but out by contact of wires with trolley wires, sent to the factory for repairs, and his action was approved.

City Electrician Len LeBaron who was present made a detailed verbal report of the condition of the fire alarm system, and the difficulties of keeping it in order under present changed conditions, without protected wires, in which he stated that Pensacola is the only city in the county in which, with such wires, the fire alarm and police call service is combined.

On motion the chairman and electrician were requested to attend and present the matter fully to the city council at its meeting to-night, together with the recommendation of the board for the necessary appropriation.

UNITED CHARITIES. Committee on Constitution and Officers Completes Its Work.

At a meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms yesterday afternoon, Rev. J. M. Dannelly in the chair, the report of the committee on constitution and by-laws was read and adopted as follows:

1. This society shall be known as "The United Charities of Pensacola," the purpose of which is the economical, judicious and impartial assistance of worthy persons who may be in distress, so far as the means of the society will allow.

2. The membership shall consist of individuals, firms or corporations who pay into the society \$3, \$5, \$10 or \$25 per annum and all members of families, thus represented shall be entitled to all privileges.

The following named persons were nominated and elected as officers of the society for the ensuing year: Wm. Fisher, president; H. G. De Silva, Sol Cahn and J. W. Lurton, vice presidents; J. N. Andrews, secretary-treasurer.
