South African Miners Place Orders For New Machinery. HOUGHTON, Mich., March 21.—Leading mine managers and engineers from the Transvaal who have visited the copper district since the beginning of the Boer war regard the destruction of mining plants in the Transvaal as perfectly probable. Mine managers are here to place orders for new equipment immediately after the destruction of the old machinery. One Johannesburg mine manager now here has full plans and specifications for a new plant, which will cost about \$1,000,000. Leading American machine manufacturers have made conditional bids on probably \$30,000,000 worth of new mining machinery for South African gold mines.

Plead Guilty to Conspiracy. SAVANNAH, March 21.—D. A. Tyson and all the men save one who have been on trial with him in the United States court charged with conspiracy, have plead guilty as charged in the indictment. D. A. Wilkes would not plead guilty and was released as the evidence was not strong against him. Judge Emory Speer will sentence the defendants soon. The case has been on trial two weeks.

Soldiers' Home at Hot Springs. WASHINGTON, March 21.—Representative Little of Arkansas has introduced a bill appropriating \$300,000 for a soldiers' hospital at Hot Springs, Ark., to which shall be admitted soldiers of all the wars in the United States, including the Spanish war, where the treatment of disease for which the waters are efficacious will be good.

Flow of Gold Indisward. CALCUTTA, March 21.—In introducing the budget today the financial member of the India council, Clinton Dawkins, alluded to the enormous flow of gold Indisward. He said it had been decided to coin an additional million silver rupees. In spite of emigration, he added, the country had stuck to the gold standard throughout.
