Resolved, That a convention of the Democratic Party of Escambia county shall be held at Powellton at 12 o'clock noon on the 14th day of April, 1900, for the purpose of selecting twelve (12) persons to represent Escambia county at the District Convention to nominate a candidate for Congress and for the purpose of selecting twelve (12) persons to represent Escambia county at the State Convention at such time and place as may be fixed by the State and Congressional Democratic Committees and for the purpose of selecting a committee to act as a committee to hold until their successors shall be selected in 1902.

- All white Democrats legally qualified to vote under the act of the legislature of 1897, contained in chapter 233 who have paid their poll taxes for the years 1898 and 1899, and who will pledge themselves to support the nominees of said primary election and said conventions shall be entitled and are cordially invited to participate in said primary election, and said primary election shall be held in all ways under the rules and regulations as set forth in said chapter 233, and this committee shall meet at the office of the county judge in the city of Pensacola, at 6 o'clock p. m. on the 12th day of April, 1900, at which time and place they will receive returns, canvass the same and announce the result of said primary election, and the inspectors above named will have then and there the returns of said election.
- The ballots to be used shall be printed on plain white paper, and shall have no distinguishing marks.
