Chipley; secretary, Miss Martha Ross; treasurer, Mrs. Laura Thornton. A committee was appointed to confer with the Confederate Veterans relative to Decoration Day exercises. The musical and literary entertainment given last night at Clutter's music hall for the benefit of the library of public school No. 1, was a splendid success. The excellent program was rendered as published, excepting that a piano solo by Miss Willis was substituted for the vocal solo by Miss Cawthon, who was unable to appear. All of the performers were encored, and little Miss Mamie Barr had the honor of a double encore, in recognition of her remarkable elocutionary powers. The board of public safety held an adjourned meeting at 3 o'clock yesterday to complete its investigation of the origin of the fire which destroyed the residence of Mr. Jeff S. Howell on West Government street, and after examining several additional witnesses the entire matter was on motion referred to the chairman with full power to act. CHARTER IS APPLIED FOR. Steps Taken to Build New Railroad in Alabama. MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 29.—Petition for the incorporation of the Chattahoochee Valley railroad has been filed with the secretary of state. The petition says that the subscribers desired to form a corporation for the purpose of acquiring, constructing or building and operating a railroad under the name of the Chattahoochee Valley Railway company, the terminals in Alabama to be at some point in or near Lanett and in or near Phenix. The amount of the capital stock will be \$100,000, divided into shares of \$100 each. The corporation is organized for the purpose of connecting with, acquiring or consolidating with a railroad in Georgia, running in a northerly direction from West Point. To Establish a Gypsum Plant. KNOXVILLE, March 29.—Agents of Charles E. Johnston of Pittsburg and W. C. Best of Bradford, England, are in the vicinity of Glade Springs, Va., examining vast deposits of gypsum. It is proposed to establish a mammoth gypsum plant at Glade Springs and utilize the product in the manufacture of kalsomine, compressed building stones, etc. The deal for the property is now pending. Gold From Cuba. NEW YORK, March 29.—The United States transport Sedgwick, Captain Hendricks, arrived today from Havana and Gibara with 51 cabin passengers and 66 discharged and furloughed soldiers, civilians, etc. The Sedgwick brought nearly \$1,000,000 in specie and a large quantity of Cuban products for the forthcoming Paris exposition.
