

Call for a State Democratic convention to be held at Jacksonville, Fla., Tuesday, June 19, 1900.

The democratic party of the state of Florida will hold a state convention at Jacksonville on Tuesday, June 19, at 12 noon, for the following purposes:

To choose delegates to represent the state in the national democratic convention, to be held at Kansas City, Mo., July 4, 1900; to nominate candidates for the offices of Governor, one Justice of the Supreme Court, a Secretary of State, Attorney-General, Comptroller, Treasurer, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Commissioner of Agriculture, and Railroad Commissioner for the term of four years; four Presidential Electors and four alternate electors, to be voted for at the next regular state election, and to transact such other business as may come before the convention.

The different counties in the state will send delegates to the convention upon the following basis of representation: One delegate for each one hundred votes cast for the candidate on the state ticket who received the highest number of votes at the general election of 1898, and one additional vote for the fraction in excess thereof, when it amounts to fifty or more. The committee has also allowed additional representation where the vote was increased at the election of 1898 in any county for state officers. The counties under this rule will be entitled to representation as follows:

The counties will select their delegates in any manner which may be considered best by the people acting through the party organization as recognized by the last state convention. All delegates are invited to participate in the selection of delegates hereto including those who have become qualified to vote since the last election. The chairman and secretary of each county convention held for the purpose of electing delegates to the state convention are requested to send to Hon. W. A. Rawls, chairman, Tallahassee, Fla., a written or printed copy of the proceedings of such county convention, together with a list of the names of the county executive committee, in which should be designated the chairman and secretary of such committee. ARABIAN ARMY DEFEATED.

French Troops Gain Decisive Victory at Inrar.

PARIS, March 30.—An official account has been issued of the victory of the French troops over the Arabian army at Inrar, which assembled with the object of attacking the French expedition which recently occupied the oasis of Insalah, southwest of Algeria. The French had learned of the scheme and decided to storm the enemy's position, which was successfully carried on March 19 by a column headed by Lieutenant Colonel Eu. The town was first bombarded and then stormed, the Arab warriors making their last stand in the mosque. They left 600 men killed and 100 wounded on the field. In addition 450 prisoners were taken. The French losses were nine native soldiers killed, 48 men and two officers wounded.

Prohibitionists to Meet.

GREENVILLE, S. C., March 30.—The special committee appointed by the prohibition conference in January met at Columbia tonight. This is a committee charged with the preliminary work of the campaign, especially in regard to organizing the forces for a systematic effort to obtain prohibition of the liquor traffic in this state, which effort is to be made as heretofore within the lines of the Democratic party.

Execution in Philippines.

MANILA, March 30.—Moralde and Gonzales, who were found guilty of murdering a countryman, were hanged at noon today in the plaza in front of the church at San Carlos, province of Pangasinan, an officer of the Seventeenth infantry presiding at the execution, which was witnessed by the principal people of the place. There was no demonstration.

Damaged by Fire.

NEW YORK, March 30.—Fire this morning did \$15,000 damage to the steamship Old Dominion, owned by the Joy Steamship company, lying at her pier in East river. The Old Dominion, which was formerly owned by the Old Dominion Steamship company, plies between New York and Boston.

Skeleton Unearthed.

SAVANNAH, March 30.—A complete skeleton of a human being was found by a house drainage workman while excavating on Gaston street between Lincoln and Habersham this morning. The skeleton was found about 8 feet under ground and was of great age, judging from its softness.

Respite For Crawford.

ATLANTA, March 30.—Governor Candler has respited Homer Crawford, the Palaski county man who was condemned to die on the gallows for murder, for 33 days, in order that the condemned man's counsel may have an opportunity to lay the facts of the case before the pardon board.

Ambush Wins Steeplechase.

LIVERPOOL, March 30.—The grand national steeplechase, run here today, the second day of the spring meeting, was won by the Prince of Wales' Ambush II. The race is for 5-year-olds and upwards, 2,500 sovereigns. Sixteen horses ran. Barsac was second and Manifesto third.

Benjamin Comegys Dead.

PHILADELPHIA, March 30.—Benjamin B. Comegys, president of the Philadelphia National bank, a director of the Pennsylvania Railroad company and a member of the board of city trusts, died here today from pneumonia. He was 81 years of age.

Cotton Mill For Winder.

WINDER, Ga., March 30.—Winder has organized a cotton mill with a capital stock of \$75,000. At a meeting of the stockholders W. B. McQuinn was elected president. The stock has all been subscribed and work will be begun at once.

Death of W. C. Sanders.

ATLANTA, March 30.—News has been received in this city of the death of William C. Sanders, senior partner of the firm of Sanders, Swann & Co., of Atlanta and Bremen, at Suwannee Springs, Fla.

Secretary to General Wright.

MEMPHIS, March 30.—Mr. Frederick Heiskell, city editor of the Memphis Scimitar, has been appointed private secretary to General Luke E. Wright, a member of the Philippine commission.

From 1894 to the close of 1898 we sent to the United Kingdom an average of 12,138 horses per annum and received \$143 per head.

A few days ago 600 horses and mules were shipped from San Francisco to the Fiji Islands, presumably for the British army in Africa.

A four cornered race has been arranged between Cresceus, Tommy Britton, Searchlight and Dan Q for the Pittsburg Independence day races.

In 1894 we exported only 5,246 horses and received an average of \$214 per head, while in 1898 we exported 51,150, at an average value of \$121.
