PRECINCT DELEGATES

The Mays Democratic Club of Pensacola has endorsed the following ticket for delegates from the city precincts to the Democratic County Convention to be held at Dowellton, April 11 and ask that they be given a hearty support by the voters: Precinct 12—C. H. Gingles, David Sheehan, Wm. Bazzell, J. D. Maxwell, and T. F. Wrighton. Precinct 13—W. A. Blount, Thos. Hannah, John Christie, J. Geo. Wattle and W. T. Duncan. Precinct 14—Geo. Brown, Jas. I. Johnson, J. E. McLaughlin, John Pfeiffer and J. E. Baars. Precinct 15—E. H. Putnam, John West, Wm. Bennett, J. E. Abercrombie and W. A. Dunham.

THE "rotation in office" principle applies with slight force to the positions of congressmen and senators, who are rarely changed except "for cause," as the lawyers say. The sentiment appears to be prevalent in both of the Florida districts that both of our efficient congressmen should succeed themselves. Davis, in the second, has only Frank Clark against him, while Sparkman has no opposition at all.

In a recent interview Former President Cleveland is reported to have said:

With reference to the canal across Nicaragua, I have always thought whatever was done in its promotion by the government of the United States should be done as a contribution by it to the cause of progress and advancing civilization. It has seemed to me that we had gained that position among nations of the world, that would make it appropriate for us in accordance with the spirit of our institutions, to make such a contribution. This, of course, means the absolute neutralization of the Nicaragua canal construction, and since the Hay-Pauncefote treaty is directly in line with this sentiment, I am, of course, strongly in favor of its ratification.

How about the question of the removal of the state capital to Jacksonville? Which candidate for governor is in favor of such removal? Duval's twenty-two votes in the state convention may go to the man who favors the removal. Who is he?—Jacksonville Metropolitans.

That is the game, is it? The welfare of the state is not to be considered. "Twenty-two" delegates to the state convention on the market to induce some man to stoop to conquer. With a perpetual municipal war on hand, daily showing to the world the political rot that exists in that city, Jacksonville is a nice place to ask the honest people of Florida to place the state government within its environment. —Mays Free Press.

Jacksonville should take warning from the old fable of the dog, with a bone in his mouth, crossing a bridge, who dropped the bone he had to seize the reflection of it in the water. Isn't the state convention glory enough for this year? There is also a lesson in Frank Clark's effort to oust Congressman Davis from his place on the removal of the capital "issue."

Two Candidates.

Rarely have any candidates for even the highest political offices been so strongly recommended to public favor as those named in the quotations which follow. The Jacksonville News says:

This is a world in which character and conduct count for everything, and in neither direction has Dannelte Mays ever been found wanting from the day when his first took up the burden of life under the dark shadow of adversity, in Jefferson county, to the moment when three years ago he laid down the speaker's gavel in the house of representatives and returned to his farm.

He has been tried by adverse circumstance, and has risen above it. He has been tried by success and has withstood an ordeal beneath which many a man has fallen. He has proven himself. He is no doubtful quantity—no uncertain factor in the life of his time. His friends know where to find him at all times and under all circumstances, nor have his opponents ever been left in doubt as to his attitude.

In the hands of a man of this type, the welfare of Florida could never be imperiled; and never perhaps in the history of the state has it been in a position when the influence of a firm character and a broad intelligence was far more necessary. We need more men and more money—more workers and more of the capital which, if it does not "make" work, gives industry and enterprise the opportunities they might otherwise lack. With Dannelte H. Mays in the gubernatorial chair, the state would be safe, and vicious and untimely legislation decidedly unsafe. In his hands all interests would find adequate protection—those that are called vested and those that should be.

The following, from the Palatka Times-Herald, is not only a statement of well known facts concerning public office, but is a fitting

tribute to the worth of the leading candidate for the office of attorney-general:

When a lawyer of reputation announces his candidacy for a high judicial office in Florida, the people rather than the individual are benefited. When the salary alone is considered the field at best is not very inviting. Florida has never paid market prices for its brains. * * * Eminent lawyers have steadfastly declined positions of this character because the emoluments of general practice eclipsed the glory that attaches to the judicial ermine. We do not pretend to say that able lawyers have not served the state. The position we take is that offers from this source are rare. Hon. James T. Wills, of Bradford county, is a candidate for attorney general, and his ability as a practitioner and worth as a citizen suggest the thought that begins this article. As a member of the legislature, Mr. Wills was chairman of the judiciary committee, a committee noted for the character of the men that composed it. Mr. Bauey, former chief justice of the supreme court, was a member. In point of salary there are more desirable offices than that of attorney-general, but the field is inviting to one who loves his state, and combines with this virtue the ability to serve his people well. Mr. Wills possesses these qualities in the truest sense. His reputation as a lawyer is well established, and his ambition in this particular is a worthy one. Florida would be vastly benefited by the services of such a citizen. Guided by Mr. Wills' strength of mind the business of the attorney-general's office would be conducted with fairness and intelligence, and the Times-Herald cordially endorses him for the place. At the proper time we trust that the voters of Putnam county will consider well his excellent qualifications and honor him as he deserves to be.

TROOPS FOR BARRANCA.
