Circuit Court. In the circuit court this morning the grand jury was empanelled, as follows: J. G. Oliver, M. O. Baggett, R. G. Stanton, D. M. Carter, J. N. Giles, F. M. Mayo, Mark McCurdy, S. S. Browder, M. Mayo, Daniel Gunning, Jos. Marques, J. E. Sierra, A. D. Alfred, Ed. Ditmars, J. M. Clutter, J. Geo. White, Jr., Mark Hurd, I. Gugenheim. The court then proceeded with the trial of the case of Peter Carroll vs. James Turtle, a suit for damages for the alleged procurement by the defendant of the discharge of the plaintiff, from employment on the government work at the navy yard and vicinity in 1896. Before the conclusion of the testimony the court took a recess until 3 o'clock.

MR. CLEVELAND'S DENIAL. He Denounces Purported Interviews on Dewey's Candidacy. PRINCETON, N. J., April 5.—Former President Cleveland declares that he has not given an interview to any one on Admiral Dewey's candidacy. Referring to published interviews he declared: "This statement is outrageous. It is false from beginning to end. A number of young men representing different papers have called on me for my opinion in relation to Admiral Dewey's announcement of his candidacy and I invariably declined to say anything whatever on the subject. If, by any possibility, I should see fit in the future to give expression on this subject, it will be done in a way that will leave no doubt as to its authenticity. In the meantime, it is safe to calculate in advance that any less authoritative statement which may be attributed to me will be an unjustifiable fabrication."

Fast Work at the Downs. LOUISVILLE, April 5.—The fastest work of the day at Churchill Downs was done by Madden's 3-year-old colt Kilmarnock. He went a mile in 1:44 with 126 pounds up. Mollie Newman worked three quarters in 1:15 1/2. Peter Wimmer sent Jean Berard, Kinley Mack and High Order a mile on the outside edge of the track in 1:49. It is the general opinion among horsemen at the track that if Wimmer would set Jean Berard down good and hard the great thorough bred could reel off a mile in 1:40.
