Surgeon Is Undergoing Heroic Treatment for Locomotor Ataxia.

CHICAGO, April 9.—Reinhold Meyer, a police surgeon, is undergoing heroic treatment at St. Joseph's hospital for locomotor ataxia. He is suspended by the neck with a halter every day and the physicians in attendance hope to cure him.

The hanging has taken place daily for a week and will be continued for two months or longer. After a hypodermic injection of compound chloride of gold and sodium is given a halter is put around Meyer's neck and he is raised from his bed. The knot is placed at the base of the brain and for 90 seconds Meyer is suspended.


