GRUESOME tales are reaching this side of the Atlantic to the effect that American methods have been adopted by the hotel keepers, lodging-housekeepers and restaurateurs of Paris, who have formed a combination to advance the prices of accommodations during the exposition period beyond all reason. The stories, if true, will not affect the vast majority of our people who cannot afford to attend the exposition, and to the few who can, a few dollars a day more or less will make no great difference.

THE coming conference of prominent southerners to consider the race problem, which will assemble at Montgomery, May 8, 9 and 10, promises to be an event of national interest and profound significance. Scores of newspapers, North and South, have approved its purposes and predicted important results from its deliberations. A fair sample of these numerous expressions may be found in the following, from the Utica, N. Y., Dispatch:

Practically, this conference means a discussion of the negro question in all its chief phases. It is understood that the conference will be of white men; but it is also understood that the leading negroes of the South, men like Booker T. Washington, heartily approve of it. Undoubtedly harm has been done in the past by busy-bodies from the North who have felt that they had a duty to perform, and who did not feel that their lack of knowledge of conditions made them the last persons in the world to solve the negro problem.

A Rich Scene.

The national democratic committee has its headquarters in Chicago, whence it has been carrying on what it has fondly imagined was a vigorous campaign for the reaffirmation of the Chicago platform "in its entirety," with one Willis Abbitt as its "press agent," sending out weekly to the democratic newspapers of the country broadsides of printed "hogwash," intended for republication, but which was rarely noticed by any of them, and usually found oblivion in their waste baskets.

Quite recently, Abbott woke up to the fact that he was not making the impression he had anticipated, and he bloomed out in the Associated Press with a "warning," to the effect that the wicked "gold democrats" were contemplating breaking into the Kansas City convention with intent to capture it and spoil all of his winter's work. In his "warning" he used some very intemperate language about the "gold democrats," denouncing them as traitors, renegades, etc., and announcing the position of the committee to be that they should be kept out of the convention—and the party—at all hazards.

When this manifesto reached the attention of the democratic leaders at Washington there were symptoms of a cyclone. A secret meeting of the national congressional committee was called, and Chair-

man Jones of the national committee was summoned to attend. Representative Dailey of New Jersey, who led the silver campaign in his state in 1896, took the floor, and addressing his remarks to Senator Jones, struck out from the shoulder thus:

You can't destroy the gold wing of the democratic party. Sir, you have been making platforms and organizing the next house and electing Bryan ever since the last election, and I want to tell you if this taint is kept up you will not only lose the next house and the next president but you will disrupt and ruin the party. If you want to elect Bryan this year you must refrain from making enemies on this silver business.

Several others who were present indulged in similar remarks, and made things so torrid for Chairman Jones that he vehemently disclaimed responsibility for the acts, expressions and opinions of his subordinate, declaring that the party organization is really anxious to harmonize all existing differences, and intimating concurrence in the demand that the Chicago end of the machine should be dispensed with immediately and indefinitely. With this understanding the meeting adjourned.

When the "warning" first appeared, several days ago, THE NEWS denounced it as an unwarranted and revolutionary assumption of power on the part of the committee, and we cannot refrain from some pardonable gratification over the fact that the leaders have taken the same view of the matter that we did.

LAST WEEK'S EXPORTS.

Shipments to Foreign Ports Were Valued at \$107,402.

The custom house records for last week show that six steamships and ten sail vessels of an aggregate tonnage of 17,102 arrived from foreign ports, and that three steamships and eight sail vessels of an aggregate tonnage of 11,174 cleared for foreign ports.

MORGAN AHEAD.

The Veteran Senator Will be Re-elected Triumphantly.

Sunday's Alabama papers show, beyond doubt, that Senator Morgan's victory in the primaries throughout the state was thorough and conclusive. The Mobile Herald says:

Returns received up to the time of going to press indicate the triumphant re-election of John T. Morgan to the United States senate. The democracy of Alabama has been true to its principles and true to itself. The true manhood of Alabama has shown that it has no aversion to a statesman who has sought to hurl a statesman from his seat.

The Register says:

The democratic primaries are over. The early bird counties set the pace for the spring brood, having given Morgan eleven to Johnston's five votes in the legislature; and now come the remaining fifty-five counties and repeat the operation, going two to one for Morgan—a landslide for the senator and a drop into the well for the governor. In Mobile county the appeal to only three precincts so far heard from being for Johnston. Victory was in the air. We felt it long in advance of any possible assurance of the way the people would vote. The cause presaged victory. It could not be doubted that when the people of Mobile knew the issue they would do what was right. They always do so.

The Montgomery Advertiser says: It was a perfect landslide yesterday. It does not seem certain that Johnston has carried a single county. Not even the most sanguine supporter of Senator Morgan had hoped to see his victory so overwhelming. Governor Johnston has lost in all of the large counties, including Jefferson, where the defeat was crushing. The advertiser's dispatches from Birmingham announce that the governor refuses to be seen, but his friends give up the fight.

The Birmingham Age-Herald says: Senator Morgan has carried the state overwhelmingly over Governor Johnston. Sanford is evidently leading in the race for governor. From reports received up to 10 o'clock to-morrow morning it has swept the state from the gulf coast to the Tennessee valley and from the Chattahoochee river to the Mississippi borders. St. Clair seems to be the only county which on yesterday cast a majority of its votes for Governor Johnston. Jefferson county, the home of the governor, has endorsed the senator by a vote of more than two to one. This is one of the most complete defeats any candidate in the history of Alabama politics ever received in his home county. Senator Morgan has already received more than enough votes to insure his election and will be nominated by the Alabama legislature on the first ballot.
