#### Nurse Aids Needed—

To women who cannot qualify as nurses or nurses aids, the Surgeon General of the Army offers a splendid opportunity for service in hospitals et aside for care of convalescent sick and wounded soldiers. Women in this class will be known as hospital attendants, and will receive \$15.00 per month for incidentals and uniforms in in addition to maintenance. In addition to the usual credentials as to character and loyalty, and the physical examination, applicants are required to be high school graduates, or an equivalent, take First Aid and Elementary Hygiene and Home Care of the Sick. Only married women between 21 and 40 and single women between 25 and 45 will be accepted. Full information can be obtained at the Pacific Division Bureau of Nursing, Flood Building, San Francisco.

#### They Need Wool-

Junior Red Cross will make furnishings for Red Cross houses, nurses houses and work rooms; also supplies for the Orthopedic Division of the Medical Department of the Army, for the Division of Curative hospitals and for the Medical Supply Depot, Besides actual furniture these allotments will include crutches, bed trays, writing desks, peg legs, bed tables, packing boxes, veneer splints, tool chests and bed boards.


