The Board of Supervisors of Mohave County, State of Arizona, met this day at the hour of 9 o'clock A. M. PRESENT: Full Board and Clerk. Upon motion the Board stands at recess until one o'clock P. M. this date. Pursuant to recess, the Board of Supervisors of Mohave County, State of Arizona, met this date at one o'clock P. M. Present full Board and Clerk. The matter of appointing a Clerk of the Superior Court taken up by the Board, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Board of Supervisors that a vacancy has occurred in the office of the Clerk of the Superior Court of Mohave County, State of Arizona, by the death of Loren Minturn Teale on November 11th, 1918. Upon motion of Member C. W. Lynch, Seconded by member L. H. Foster, (With the following vote, Lynch, Aye, Foster Aye, Stephens No.) the following resolution is hereby adopted: BE IT RESOLVED THAT BY VIRTUE OF THE DEATH OF Loren Minturn Teale, Clerk of the Superior Court of Mohave County, State of Arizona, a vacancy in said office is hereby found to exist, and is hereby declared by the Board of Supervisors of Mohave County, State of Arizona, in regular session assembled. And by virtue of the Law in such cases made and approved, F. N. Van Marter a duly qualified person is hereby appointed to fill such vacancy, said appointment to become effective at 9 o'clock A. M., November 16th, 1918. By order of the Board of Supervisors of Mohave County, State of Arizona, at regular session, this 15th day of November, 1918. The written resignation of F. N. Van Marter, as Clerk of the Board of Supervisors received and accepted by the Board, effective at 9 o'clock, A. M., November 16th, 1918. Upon motion of L. H. Foster, seconded by C. W. Lynch and by unanimous consent of the Board, Mary Kaus is hereby appointed Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Mohave County, State of Arizona, said appointment effective at 9 o'clock A. M., November 16th, 1918. Upon motion the Board stands at recess until 9 o'clock A. M., November 16th, 1918.

MRS. CATHERINE BIND DIED TUESDAY EVENING

Mrs. Katherine Bind, beloved wife of Edward M. Bind, manager of the Emerson Mine near Chloride, died on Tuesday evening, Dec. 3rd, death having resulted finally from an operation performed last May for removal of cancer. Evidently the progress of the cancerous growth was arrested but temporarily and about two weeks ago it began to attack her vital organs, after which she sank rapidly.

She was born in Austria in 1853 and was there married to Mr. Bind in 1872. To this union three daughters were born, one of whom, Ida, survives and at present is teaching in the Chloride school. The family emigrated to America in 1880 and have made their home here ever since.

Mrs. Bind was a believer in Christ and well known for her faithful discharge of the many duties of wife and mother. The sympathy of the community is extended the husband and daughter who survive. On Thursday at ten in the morning her remains were laid to rest in the Chloride cemetery there to wait the resurrection call. Brief services at the grave were conducted by P. S. Virgin.

INFLUENZA RUNNING STRONG IN BISBEE

One hundred deaths and more than 5000 cases of influenza is the record for Bisbee since that disease hit the camp about two months ago. Bisbee has done everything possible to prevent the further spread of the disease, the big mining companies offering every service at their command to stamp it out.

Another camp that has been hard hit is Mogollon, New Mexico, a town of 200 inhabitants. Every person in the camp has suffered from the disease. There were 57 deaths and owing to the fact that none of the people were able to bury the dead miners had to be sent from a neighboring camp to do the work. Doctors and nurses were sent in and the patients appear to be recovering.

ELECTRIFICATION COAST LINES RECOMMEND BY WILLIAM G. M'ADOO

D. M. Fulsom, who has been acting as fuel administrator for the Pacific coast, has recommended to William G. McAdoo, through Mark L. Requa, the electrification of all railroads operated in the mountain sections of the coast, he estimates a saving in fuel of 3,062,200 barrels of oil annually. It is estimated that the saving in operating expenses, aside from that affected between the use of electricity and oil, will be \$4,923,300. The cost of electrifying will be approximately \$23,000,000.

The electrification of these railroads would be along the same lines as those proposed by the Miner for the past several years, which covers the main and subsidiary lines of the Santa Fe railroad from Colorado to Los Angeles, the power to be generated in the Grand Canyon of the Colorado by means of great dams and turbines. The cost of this installation would not be more than the estimated cost of the electrification of the other coast roads and would be along safer and more extensive use of the power, as we consider that power for pumping water onto the valley lands of the north part of this state and to operate other industries could be developed. It would also result in the conservation of flood water of the watershed of the Colorado river and bring under irrigation millions of acres of lands which do not get a normal fall of rain. No other project that has been mentioned in recent years compares with the damming of the river in the Grand Canyon and the generation of power.

WOMEN NUMBER 22 AS OFFICERS IN STATE AND COUNTY

PHOENIX, Dec. 7.—The women have drawn twenty-two places out of a total of about 320 state and county offices filled at the late general election in Arizona. They have no representation in state office and none in the legislative senate, but there are four in the House of Representatives and at least one woman has been elected in each of the fourteen counties excepting only Graham and Yavapai.

The women in the House are: Mrs. Pauline O'Neill, from Maricopa, the only Democratic legislator chosen in that county, reelected; Mrs. Rosa McKay, radical Democrat, from Gila, reelected after service in the last House from Cochise county; Mrs. Nellie M. Hayward of Cochise county, Democrat, reading clerk in the last House; Mrs. J. H. Westover of Yuma, a Democrat.

Nine of the fourteen county school superintendents will be women, namely: Nancy L. Gibbons, Apache; Elsie Toles, Cochise; Lenora Francis, Coconino; Lucy Nash, Gila; Jessie Billingsley, Greenlee; Mrs. R. A. Lassell, Mohave; Vera Mae Schurtz, Pima; Lois LeBaron, Pinal; Mrs. J. A. Saxon, Santa Cruz; Nora E. Morrow, Yuma. All were reelected, save in Apache and Gila.

To the place of county recorder were elected: Mary W. Wilkins, Apache; Irene Bart, Coconino; Edith Jacobs Maricopa; Pauline Woods, Navajo; Mary E. McGee, Pinal. The present recorders in Apache and Yavapai counties are women. The successful aspirants in Coconino, Maricopa and Navajo counties are present deputy recorders.

Olive J. Failor has been elected Superior Court clerk in Pima and Minnie M. Bennett to the same office in Pinal.

Sussie R. Tenney will be county treasurer in Apache.
