RICH MINES PRESENTED TO REWARD RED CROSS

Wonderful deposits of chrome have been discovered in Siberia, the whereabouts of the mines having been revealed by Siberians who had been treated by the American Red Cross during their illness. The Red Cross was operating at Prizen, Serbia, during the typhoid and other epidemics and many in dire distress were saved from death. As a token of their gratitude men who were brought back to life by the Red Cross were shown the enormous deposits, said to be sufficiently large to supply the wants of the world for years to come. Of course the mines have not been examined by mining men or engineers, the account being sent out to the press by men knowing nothing about mineral deposits.

It is said that the mines will be operated as soon as the Austrians return the machinery stolen during the war from Serbian mines. It is also stated that veins rich in lead and cinabar have been found in the region with the chrome. It will be remembered that a report was sent out a few years ago that the Austrians had discovered some of the richest copper mines in the world in Serbia, but the same report went on to say that Serbia was the second largest producer of copper in the world, which any schoolboy knows to be untrue. Serbia had some small veins of copper, but of no unusual value, nor are any of them really workable as a commercial proposition. The country is mountainous and there are many small veins of metal throughout the northern and western part of the country.

Charles Bly is nursing a sprained wrist caused from an accident in cranking "Lizzie." Not all the kick is in the moonshine it seems.


Arthut Heath accompanied by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Pearl Heath left the 28th overland for a months visit at Prescott, Verde, etc.
