

**All Signs Point  
Toward Big Activity**

Katherine mine, where over \$4,000,000 worth of ore is blocked out, and upon the further facts that the veins of the district show an increase in gold values with depth. Another feature that speaks well for the mining future of the Katherine District is the fact that W. J. Loring, one of the most successful gold miners of the West, is operating a property there.

A few days ago W. J. Cleary of Fresno, and E. C. Reed of San Francisco, California, took options on mining properties in the Katherine District. Cleary, formerly a field man in the mining camps of the West for the late Patsy Clark of Spokane, Washington, has the call on a group of claims located in the vicinity of the Gold Chain property. Reed, who is also a mining man of long practical experience, has the call on a group that sidelines the California group on the north near the endline of the Katherine Extension property. The California group on the north near the endline of the Katherine Extension property. The California and Katherine Extension holdings were acquired about two months ago by Charles N. Miller and associates of San Francisco. Miller is one of the potentially big operators of the district and is already sinking a double-compartment deep working shaft on the Katherine Extension. The work is being facilitated by hoisting and compressor plants.

At the Katherine mine, where the ore already blocked out demonstrates the early coming in of one of the big gold producers of the country, a new vein has been discovered about 100 feet to the north of the parallel with the main Katherine vein. Both of these veins appear to course through the Katherine Extension property and from there into the Gold Chain property. The management of the Katherine mine will make no extended effort to develop the newly-discovered north vein until a larger plant of machinery has been installed. This work will not, however, be long delayed as the various units of the new equipment are now being freighted to the property.

The sinking of the shaft from the 400-foot level to a depth of 700 feet will soon start and while the work is going on an ore-reduction plant will be erected. With ore going to mill the Katherine mine will soon rank with such noted gold producers as the United Eastern and the Tom Reed, for the ore is extensively blocked out on the several levels and the tonnage is being increased with each day's development work.

**THE MANIPULATION OF  
SILVER**

Positive confirmation about efforts to lower the price of American silver comes from one of the best posted mine operators who has returned to Reno after spending several months in New York. The movement has been carefully shielded from the public, but the negotiations or conferences have been prolonged for such a length of time that an inkling of the truth has filtered out. According to these reports a British monetary conference has been engaged spreading a propaganda in Washington against perpetuating the Pittman silver purchase act by advancing the theory that it would be better for all concerned to stabilize the white metal around 80 cents, which would come near splitting the difference between the present London quotation and the price fixed by the Pittman act. The principle of the suggestion does not appeal to any thinking American and it is said that the administration is not inclined to hearken to the suggestion that the United States become a party to the conference.

From all information at hand it is certain that the only nation that would derive any profit from the undertaking would be Great Britain, which is now under bond to this country to pay back 208,000,000 ounces loaned during the war to placate the turbulent population of India. Through conditions over which the United States has no control the enormous silver reserve of the treasury was placed at the disposal of Great Britain for the same reason that we

placed ships of war and manufacturing facilities at the command of each one of the allied governments. The cost price did not enter into consideration.

The courtesy was a war measure with the express stipulation that the silver would be restored to the depository as fast as American mines could produce the required amount. England got that silver for \$1 an ounce. Had the allies been forced to go into the open market they would not have found the desired quantity of the metal at any price and what they could find would have cost them

double or treble what the treasury of the United States received. Other trades and producers, notoriously, the farmers, got their pound of flesh but the silver miner was held down by an artificially depressed market and was cheated out of the fabulous war profits which inured to every branch of business. Should any serious thought be given this offering of 80 cents it would entail a monstrous injustice and rank with the perfidy that demonized silver almost 50 years ago.
