CLEAN-UP SQUAD HERE MONDAY AT THE LEGION HALL

Ex-service men will receive free medical attention at the American Legion Hall, Kingman, Monday, September 26. The "Clean-up" squad will be there and two doctors will be in the company. If any ex-service men believe there is anything wrong with them physically, they are urged to be examined. If you do not live in Kingman and you have a just claim, your transportation to Kingman and return will be paid in addition to one nights lodging.

This "Clean-up" squad is empowered to make arrangements for hospitalization, vocational training or any benefits due any ex-service man and can settle any question but compensation right on the ground. They will handle compensation questions though and get you quick action. The squad will be at the American Legion headquarters all day Monday.
