**Cooking by Electricity.**

The Hotel Bernina, at Samaden, has for some time been lighted with electricity, power being supplied by a waterfall. As during the day this power is not required for lighting, and is therefore running to waste, the proprietor of the hotel has hit upon the idea of utilizing the current for cooking when it is not required for lighting, and an experimental cooking apparatus has been constructed. This contains German silver resistance coils, which are brought to a red heat by the current, and it has been found possible to perform all the ordinary cooking operations in a range fitted with a series of such coils.—Engineering and Mining Journal.

W. W. Wall, the contractor of the mail route between Tombstone and Rucker's Cañon, came in last evening with the mail. He makes weekly trips at present. The route extends to Powers' ranch, on White river and Mr. Wall is trying to get an extension twelve miles farther to Capt. Gray's ranch. At present the residents of Rucker's Cañon are compelled to come from nine to twelve miles for their mail, and the extension would carry the mail directly to them. The contractor will soon present a petition to the postal authorities for our business men to read and sign, asking for the extension. At the same time a petition will be sent from the residents of the cañon asking that Capt. Gray be appointed as postmaster. The idea of extending the route should be favorably considered by our business men, as all the supplies for that region will come through Tombstone and will be quite an item.

Captain Watkins, a member of the 14th legislature, was brought down from the Castle creek hot springs, where he went for rheumatism, to his home on the old Tweed ranch. He is suffering from complete paralysis of the left side, extending to tongue and throat. Dr. Hughes says he may live but cannot recover the use of the affected part, which comprises the whole left side from shoulder to foot. The captain is about 65 years old. His many friends will anxiously await news of his improvement.—Phenix Herald.

Talk about your trusts, Phenix has one of the most unique in the United States. The Chinese here have formed a syndicate and run all the restaurants. **The Effect of Strangling Our Mexican Trade.**

A dispatch to the New York Times from the City of Mexico again confirms our anticipations, already confirmed by the London Mining Journal, as to the probability of the diversion of the Mexican smelting business from this country to England or Germany, or to English or German works established in Mexico, in the event of the reversal of the Treasury ruling, allowing the free admission into this country of certain silver lead ore.

This dispatch states that steps are already being taken on a large scale by German and English capitalists, in expectation of the imposition of a duty on the lead in silver-lead ores, to establish important smelting works at several points in the north of Mexico, in which case not only will this country lose the profitable business that it is now carrying on in transporting, buying and working these Mexican ores, and the reciprocal commerce that arises from this traffic, but our own smelters in the Southwest will not even have the poor compensation of moving their establishments over the border free from foreign competition.

There is not the slightest doubt that if the contemplated change is made in the tariff it will play into the hands of our competitors for Mexican trade, and we shall be throwing away, for a wholly inadequate equivalent, the export trade to Mexico, which, since General Grant negotiated the treaty of reciprocity with Mexico, has been the object of our most sagacious statesmen.—Engineering and Mining Journal.
