LONDON, Aug. 13.—Meetings to consider the case of Mrs. Maybrick were held at the Cannon street hotel to-day. A resolution was adopted to petition the Home Secretary for a remission of her sentence.

Ordered New Elections.

PARIS, Aug. 13.—The State Council has announced elections in twelve cantons in which Boulanger was elected to the General Council, on the ground that the General was not legally eligible to the position.

Pleaded Guilty.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Eben S. Allen, President of the Forty-second and Grant street ferry railroad company, was arraigned before Judge Gildersleeve to-day. He pleaded guilty to the count in the indictment charging him with an over issue of stock. Sentence was deferred till Friday.

A Quadrangular Duel.

GRAND RAPIDS, Aug. 13.—Sheriff P. J. Sinclair and his brother, D. A. Sinclair, went to Browne township last night to arrest a farmer named Goch and his hired man, Charles Brailey, for theft. A fight followed, during which D. A. Sinclair and Brailey were killed. Goch escaped.

Company G.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 13.—At Camp Diamond to-day a skirmish drill took place and was witnessed by a large crowd. To-morrow the regiment will break camp and leave for home. Governor Waterman visited the camp to-day and was warmly welcomed. Company G. was awarded the first prize for target practice.

A Good Idea.

BALTIMORE, Aug. 13.—At a meeting of the commercial exchanges to-day resolutions were passed to the effect that the quadri-centennial anniversary of the discovery of America is too great an event to be controlled by any city. That it should be held under the auspices of the eighteen nations of the three Americas, and that Washington city is the most appropriate place.

They Marched Past Each Other.

BERLIN, Aug. 13.—The whole army corps of guards paraded to-day before the Emperor of Austria, making a brilliant display. The weather was splendid. The Emperors appeared on horse back. Emperor William commanded the troops and led the first center corps and afterwards the first regiment of guards and passed the visiting sovereign, who then headed the regiment bearing his name and marched past Emperor William.

PARIS, Aug. 13.—The court this afternoon found General Boulanger guilty of conspiracy.

Having Lots of Fun.

BAR HARBOR, Aug. 13.—President Harrison received warm greetings on his return here to-day. Senator Hale drove President Harrison and Secretary Blaine in a carriage to the depot. As the special train to the ferry was taken at Bar Harbor wharf a good sized crowd greeted the President and cheered him vigorously as he passed to the carriage which was to take him and friends to Stanwood. To-morrow he will be accompanied to Bath by Secretary Tracy. Governor Burleigh will probably meet the Presidential special train at Augusta or Bath.

This Time It Is Truckee.

TRUCKEE, Cal., Aug. 13.—The most destructive fire that has occurred for years started from a defective flue in the house of C. E. Dullen this morning. Heroic efforts were made by the citizens, but a fierce wind was blowing and the inflammable nature of the building gave the flames full sway for several hours. Volunteers poured in from every side, and with the limited appliances at hand did good work, though the flames spread from building to building as though the houses were made of kindling wood. The business portion of the city was saved through the efforts of the fire fighters and the direction in which the wind was blowing. Residences, churches and schools suffered in its stead. Thirty-four buildings were burned to the ground and the loss will probably foot up over \$150,000. Among the buildings burned were the public school houses, two churches and the American hotel. No railroad property was burned.
