THERE is some interesting reading for Arizona in our dispatches this morning.

WONDER if Governor Wolfley will feel entirely happy when he reads the charges brought against Chief Justice Wright, and considers the nature of the chief complaint made against the Judge?

It now appears that Judge Barnes had already made arrangements with Judge Kibbey to try the robbery cases, and if Marshal Meade and the grand jury had kept their shirts on all this disgraceful squabble would have been avoided.

IN a case submitted to Judge Barnes some time since, he decided that an unconfirmed Mexican land grant was not sufficient title on which to maintain an action for ejectment.

THE Tucson Star, in the face of the published statement of Governor Wolfley, reiterates the charge that none of the employes of the public institutions have received any pay for the past six months.

A Deputy Marshal Killed. BELLE GROVE, Ala., Oct. 3.—U. S. Deputy Marshal Charles Sparks, was shot and killed yesterday by Louis Ezzel, who was resisting arrest.

South Dakota Goes Republican by 20,000. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Oct. 3.—Sioux Falls concedes the temporary capital to Pierre. Prohibition was carried by at least 5,000. The Republican State ticket was elected by 20,000.

Robbed Her Husband and Eloped. LITTLE FALLS, Wis., Oct. 3.—Mrs. K. R. Hands, wife of the jailer, last night robbed her husband and released the highway robber John Mitchell and eloped with him.

Found Guilty for Making a False Report. BUFFALO, Oct. 3.—Gen. Lester B. Faulkner was this morning found guilty for making a false report of the condition of the Nashville National Bank in 1887. The bank was wrecked. Faulkner was sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary.

Steamer Foundered at Sea. NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Dispatches to the Marine Exchange dated Nassau, September 10, announce the steamer Earnmore, from Baltimore for Rio Janeiro, foundered at sea in a gale on September 5th. All lives lost except seven. Total loss, about twenty-eight.

Drowned in a Slough. FRESNO, Cal., Oct. 3.—J. H. Hamilton, a prominent citizen and capitalist, was drowned this morning in the slough at his farm near San Jose. He had been to the slough to water some colts, and it is supposed he was injured by the animals in some manner as the water is not three feet deep.

Arrested for Embezzlement. MERIDEN, Conn., Oct. 3.—Chas. S. Pratt, the confidential bookkeeper of the secretary and cashier of the H. Wales' lines company, was arrested for embezzlement of over \$10,000. The affair caused a profound sensation, as Pratt was an officer in several local organizations, and treasurer of the First Congregational Society, also city alderman. He has confessed.

The International Congress. WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—The delegates to the International American Congress were astir early to prepare for a long trip arranged for them by the Department of State. They partook of an early breakfast, made their way to the Pennsylvania railway station, where they were received by William E. Curtis, special agent of the State Department, in charge of the excursion.

Chief Justice Wright.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—A Washington special says: For some time past vigorous efforts have been made to procure the removal of Chief Justice Wright of Arizona, but no one could be found ready to put the complaint against him in a proper shape. The formal charges, however, duly signed and sworn to, have at last reached Washington and an investigation has been ordered. The principal accusation is that the Chief Justice overrode the laws of the Territory in several cases, and had a way of imposing a penalty of banishment upon judges instead of the punishments prescribed in the statutes.

Election Returns From the New States. MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 3.—The 1901 returns make it appear that the Union is defeated in North Dakota by 1,200 though the Prohibitionists claim the State.

In South Dakota Prohibition was carried by 80,000 to 100,000, and went Republican by 20,000.

The Journal's Helena special says the returns from outside positions are coming in very slowly. Carter's (Republican) election to congress is considered by the opposition. Both sides still claim the governorship. The legislature still hangs in the balance. The majority of the State ticket is Republican, but the big figures have been knocked into splinters.
