SOME REMARKS.

For some reason to us unknown the Tucson papers maintain a most discreet silence on everything pertaining to the recent remarkable happenings in that town. The silence is so complete that it is suggestive of a muzzle. The people have been waiting day after day for the facts and inside history of the case, but it is not forthcoming. This question is not one of politics, but is a matter that affects the good name of the Territory, therefore of interest to our citizens, who are desirous of getting at the bottom facts. The DAILY EPITAPH has for several days been trying to discover the facts, but up to the present those we have been able to glean are very meagre. However, we have taken steps that will probably bring out all the facts in the case. From what we have been able to learn it appears, without much doubt, that a conspiracy has been formed between Brewster Cameron, Marshal Meade and others to "down" Judge Barnes and secure the reward for the conviction of the Wham robbers, whether the parties under arrest are guilty or innocent, and that they will stick at nothing to accomplish their ends.

The animus of Cameron is known to be decisions rendered by Judge Barnes that prevented Cameron from fencing in public land, and also interfered with his practice of running cattle across the line just prior to the arrival of the assessor, and then driving them back when he had gone away. For these acts Cameron swore vengeance and declared he would have the Judge's scalp.

Last winter Judge Barnes and Marshal Meade had a serious misunderstanding at Prescott, and it has been an open secret that he was leaving no stone unturned to secure the Judge's removal, and since the arrest of the Wham robbers and the reduction of Webb's bond has been particularly active, going so far as to spread broadcast the report that the Judge had been bribed. Evidently the Marshal was not entirely satisfied that he could convict the men he had arrested, and thinking his chances would be better with another judge, and also at the same time vent his spite, determined to make a last, desperate effort to secure Judge Barnes' removal, and has stopped at nothing to carry out his purpose. In Cameron he found an interested, willing ally. Conceiving that a request from a United States grand jury would serve them, Cameron, by arguments which we have been unable as yet to unearth, prevailed upon all but one member of the late grand jury (Mr. Upton) to sign the remarkable telegram forwarded to Washington. Being afraid to send it from Tucson, Mr. Bruce took Saturday

evening's train for Benson, from which place the telegram was sent Saturday evening or Sunday morning. Afraid to face the music, Mr. Bruce sent a telegram asking Judge Barnes to excuse him from further attendance, but the Judge declined, and he had to be in attendance when the jury was called into court on Monday morning, when the matter of the sending of the telegram to Washington was exposed.

While the scheme was being worked up in the jury room by Cameron, who was indisputable, United States Attorney Johnson was called in and asked his opinion as to whether it would be contempt of court, but he declined to say anything. Colonel Higgins was then called in and asked the same question, which he said that in his opinion it was not contempt, but as to its propriety he would leave it to them to judge.

The last man to sign the telegram was Mr. Bruce. When being strongly pressed to sign he remarked that if Mr. Upton would sign he would, where the latter gentleman said, in effect, that if he waited until that occurred the telegram would never leave that room; but Bruce finally signed it and then rushed off to Benson to send it.

Another strange thing is, that when a new jury was ordered the Marshall, instead of sending a blank venire for this county, picked out his men, and it turns out that, with one exception, they are all clients of the attorney for the prosecution from this county. This would seem to indicate that they indulged the vain hope that by this method they would get men who will find indictments against the accused parties whether the evidence justified their action or not.

Any one accused of crime is generally supposed to be allowed every facility to establish their innocence, but from present appearances every obstacle is being thrown in their way, with the sole idea of convicting them, whether guilty or innocent, and thereby earn the reward.

Officers thus using the machinery of the law to oppress people and to wreak their personal feelings should be given a taste of it themselves.

Taken all together, it smells very much of a conspiracy, and Marshal Meade and Mr. Cameron are liable to wake up to a realizing sense of the fact that they have put their foot in it.

The silver convention to be held in St. Louis is attracting widespread attention. Each State and Territory is entitled to twenty members. From a gentleman just arrived from Denver the DAILY EPITAPH learns that Colorado will be fully represented, and that in that State its great importance is recognized, and that it is the general topic of conversation. Arizona, being deeply interested in this matter, and Tombstone particularly so, steps should be taken to send representatives to St. Louis. We would suggest that a meeting be held and at least three men chosen from this town, and that they be representative mining men.

This number thirteen shows up as usual in this grand jury business.

The Crocker Estate.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5.—The estate of the late Chas. Crocker, who died in August 1888, was settled in the Probate Court today, the court confirming the acts of the executors in the distribution to the heirs and legatees the full balance of \$22,000,000, from an estate which was appraised at \$34,142,474. The widow's share is \$2,866,244.

An Embezzler.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 5.—Gillman P. Robinson, only son of ex-president E. P. Robinson, of Brown University, is an embezzler and fugitive. He has been register of the University for several years, and the amount of the shortage is unknown. He kept two cash books, one false and one true.

Steamer Collision.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Oct. 5.—The steamer S. S. Georgia for New York returned, having been in collision with a Cuban steamer. Her bows were stove in and one of the crew killed. The damage to the State of Georgia is above the water line. The vessel with which she was in collision was the coasting steamer Agate. The latter's forecastle head was smashed.

Property Destroyed by Fire.

SENECA CITY, Oct. 5.—Forty-four thousand dollars worth of property, insured for eleven thousand, was destroyed this morning. The dwelling house of J. E. James was burned and also other buildings, about two thousand dollars, and just as this fire was under control another blaze was discovered at Bowermans paint shop, on the plaza several blocks away. In a few minutes the paint shop with several other buildings were enveloped in the flames which spread rapidly and extended to dwelling houses. John Ramecliff, Thos. Mohr and Moses Stever, Gehrig's brewery and dancing academy, Hales' and Braden's saloon and stores, Nisenburger Bros. and a dozen other buildings all of which were reduced to ashes. The heaviest loss was sustained by George Gehrig, twenty thousand dollars. Two tramps were arrested on suspicion of starting the fire at the plaza, but there is no evidence against them as the idea arose from their being on the street at the time the fire was discovered.

Railway Incident. NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—A party, Pa. special says: "Twenty-five passengers are reported killed and injured in a frightful railway accident two miles from this city. The passenger train on the Western, New York and Pennsylvania road collided with a freight. Full particulars are not learned."

A Freight Train Runs Into a Passenger.

CONY, Pa., Oct. 5.—The rear end of the southbound freight on the Western, New York and Pennsylvania railroad broke loose as the train was climbing the summit, four miles south of here this morning, running down hill and crashed into a passenger train following with terrific force. All the passengers were bruised and some injured seriously, but not fatally.

A Cyclone.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 5.—A cyclone in the Carmen Islands off the coast of Campeche, on the 4th, destroyed the shore with wreckage from vessels in the harbor. Only one vessel out of thirty-five weathered the gale. All the schooners that had sought refuge at a point called Quintilled, were also wrecked. Loss in the city \$50,000. The ruins are being overhauled for dead bodies. News of great distress in other towns near Carmen is received. Houses are being demolished and crops laid low. The loss will not fall short of one million dollars.
