BULLION PRODUCTION AND SILVER.

The United States Director of the Mint's annual report gives the bullion product of the world, says the Mining and Scientific Press, as follows: Gold, \$105,994,150; silver, commercial value, \$103,556,000—coinage value, \$142,439,150.

A close analysis of the above shows that bimetalists are pursuing the proper course when they demand the re-coinage of silver, and our country, more than any one nation, is directly interested in the promotion of this desirable result.

Touching on the silver question, we give the following from the New York Financial News, October 30th: "The feeling is growing rapidly that if the Secretary of the Treasury does not conclude to increase the coinage before Congress meets, that that body will probably instruct the Secretary to increase the coinage to the maximum amount, \$4,000,000 per month."

Booms Silver by Means of a Big Convention.

PATRIOTIC CATHOLIC ADDRESS

A Triple Killing—Bonner Gets the Swift Filly—Progress of the Cronin Trial.

Special to the Daily Epitaph. Minister Kills His Wife and Son.

STOCKTON, Cal., Nov. 12.—A report has been received here that a Congregational minister named Ross killed his wife and 12-year-old son and then committed suicide at Lockford, about fifteen or twenty miles from here, at four o'clock this morning. No details of the tragedy received yet.

Further Particulars. STOCKTON, Nov. 12.—A. A. Ross, a preacher living near Lockford, early this morning shot and killed his wife, his 8-year-old son and himself. He was a Methodist minister for several years, but lately has been an itinerant Congregationalist, traveling about selling books. He had not lived happily with his wife, and they separated some time ago. She supported herself and boy by teaching school near Lockford, and made her home near the residence of Frank Frost. For some time past he has been living in the same house and taking his wife home at the close of school hours. He did this yesterday and remained with her all night. He arose at five o'clock this morning and shot her through the temple with a pistol while she was asleep, killing her instantly. The report awakened the little boy, who slept in an adjoining room. He rushed into his parents' room and his father shot him twice, once in the cheek and once in the temple, causing another death. Before Foster's family could reach the room Ross shot himself in the head and soon died. The cause of the tragedy is not known. The inquest was held this afternoon.

The Call on the President.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The committee from the Catholic Congress, in session at Baltimore, visited on the President this morning by appointment and presented him with an address. The address states: "The Catholics, through you, express to their fellow-citizens of this great republic, in a spirit of unity and brotherly love, their desire, while pursuing the dictates of our conscience in serving God, to march hand in hand in promoting the best interests of our common country and the welfare of society. In reply the President said he appreciated the compliment paid him by the visitors, as well as the truth of the sentiments expressed in the address in regard to the fidelity of the Catholics of the United States to the constitution and laws of the country. He regretted his official duties would prevent him attending the session of Congress, but he thought he could promise them that he would be present at the opening of the Catholic University in this city to-morrow. The committee returned to Baltimore in the afternoon, well pleased with their visit.

Store Burglarized.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12.—Burglars last night broke into the safe of Davis Bros' Golden Rule Bazaar, Market street, and secured over \$3,000 worth of jewelry. Peizotto & Silverman's dry goods store, adjoining, was also entered and \$50 secured from the safe.

Bonner Gets the Filly.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Robert Bonner has purchased the great three-year-old filly, Sufoel, from Senator Stanford, of California. Sufoel on Saturday last trotted a mile in the unparalleled time, for a three-year-old, of 2:10 1/2. Bonner's offer for Sufoel was made and accepted by Senator Stanford before she made this great performance.

The Congress Adjourns.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 12.—The concluding session of the Congress of Catholic laymen was held to-day, with all the enthusiasm and crowds of spectators that characterized the opening meeting. Hon. Horace Mercier, Prime Minister of Quebec, made an address, in many respects one of the most rousing heard this week.

Celero is the Front.

DENVER, Nov. 12.—The Silver Convention met at the Chamber of Commerce this morning with about five hundred delegates present from various parts of the State. The convention was called for the purpose of taking some decisive steps towards securing the free coinage of silver and adopting a platform for the Colorado delegates to the coming Silver Convention at St. Louis. The convention will also recommend to Governor Cooper the names of delegates to be appointed to the St. Louis convention.

The Cronin Trial.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—At the Cronin trial this morning Pauline Hertel, a washerwoman, testified that she passed the Carlson cottage between eight and nine o'clock on the night of the murder. She saw a white horse drawing a buggy, in which were three men, drive up to the cottage. The larger man entered the cottage. The driver of the white horse at once turned around and drove back to Chicago. The witness stated that she heard some one cry, "O, God," and then the sound of a hard blow and somebody falling.
